Moody, who it will be recollected, has the contract for carrying the mails between the Dalles and Portland for four years, commencing on the 1st of July next—in company with several other gentlemen, to put on steam boats between the two points, for the purpose of carrying the mails, also passengers and freight, that Hon. O. H. Hanson will take the contract for building the portage at the Cascades, between the upper and middle landing, and will then put on teams and transport the freight over the same; the distance over the portage being only one and a quarter miles.
