Moreland; Assessor, John Thomas; Coroner, Hiram Straight.

The above ticket embraces some very good and substantial men. Mr. Starkwater is known to be a man of good abilities, and has heretofore been a firm Republican; Messrs. Cochran and Ramsby are both Republicans and Mr. Strickler has acted with the Demoerats since 1870, but is not a partisan. Mr. Joseph Young has been a Democrat. The candidate for Sheriff, Mr. H. S. Buck, is a firm and reliable Republican, and has acted with that party up to within the past two weeks.
