### City Seminary.

The City Seminary was formally closed for the summer vacation on Tuesday. For two weeks, the teachers have been busy with reviews and examinations of the pupils.

Loaded.—The Governor Grover comes down each trip fully loaded with freight and a great many passengers. Long before this time, in fact, it is estimated that the freight has been virtually closed on the upper Willamette. The Alice also brings down good loads of freight.

Prof. Nicholson.—This gentleman has been elected Principal of the Oregon City Seminary. He is known to possess all the qualifications, as a teacher to give entire satisfaction, and we are fully assured that the Seminary will maintain its present high standing as an educational institution under his management.

In Town.—Mr. C. H. Myers, of Willamette county, a former resident of this place, arrived in town yesterday and is visiting friends and relatives. He does not look very bad, considering his recent defeat for State Senator.

School Teachers.—School teachers will remember that the public examination takes place next Saturday. All are requested to be punctual in their attendance. The time to commence is 9 o'clock a. m., at the Seminary. Applicants are requested to furnish their own stationery.

For Sale.—On the 2d of next month the Sheriff of this county will sell all property advertised for delinquent taxes. Persons interested should remember the time.

Good Steer.—The upper Willamette is all in good boating shape. Steamboatmen are happy as long as they are not compelled to run on dry land and sand bars.

Clarkamas' Portion.—Clarkamas county's portion of the irreducible school money is \$4,922.67 coin, and \$207.70 in currency.

### Congressional News.

Washington, June 17.—Littell has succeeded in raising the amount of thirty-six claims of citizens of Siskiyou county, amounting to \$25,000, for supplies and transportation during the Mexican war.

The House Judiciary Committee, today, by a vote of six to five, resolved to impeach Judge DuRoi, of Louisiana, and Judge Bastien, of Alabama.

The President has approved the joint resolution for a termination of the treaty of the United States with the King of the Belgians.

Washington, June 18.—The Senate has passed the bill for building a bridge across the Willamette river at Salem.

Chicago, June 18.—Washington Convention on the Currency Bill finally came to a conclusion late today by agreeing on a bill providing for redistribution of the National Currency, and fixing the legal tender circulation at \$382,000,000. This bill will pass the Senate, and possibly the House.

The President has signed the act authorizing the Secretary of War to ascertain the expenses incurred by Oregon and California in the suppression of Indian hostilities in the years 1872 and 1873.

The Senate has agreed to the following amendments to the Sundry Civil Appropriation Bill: Increasing the sum for surveys in Oregon from \$40,000 to \$60,000.

In opposing the motion to strike out of the River and Harbor Appropriation Bill the section directing surveys to be made at numerous points throughout the country, including the Columbia River, Mitchell showed that while freight charges between Chicago and New York by rail are nine and one-tenth cents per mile, and by river ten and one-half cents per mile, freight charges on the Columbia river, by reason of monopoly, are from ten to twelve cents per mile in coin.

### Under the new apportionment

of the Western and Southern States, except Montana and Wyoming, will receive portions of the redistributed currency. Ohio receives about \$4,000,000; Indiana, \$2,500,000; Minnesota, \$2,000,000; Nebraska, \$300,000 and the other Western and Southern States much larger sums.

The Senate was in executive session four hours this afternoon on the Canada Reciprocity Treaty. There was no vote or indication to show whether the requisite two-thirds vote to ratify it could be obtained. The treaty will go over until the next session of Congress for final action.

Washington, June 23.—The President has signed the Geneva Award Bill, and has appointed Hezekiah Wells, of Michigan; Martin Raynor, of Mississippi; George H. Wood-ward, of Pennsylvania, and Caleb Baldwin, of Ohio, Judges of the Court of Commission to distribute the award. John Davis, of Massachusetts is clerk of the commission.

It was stated some time ago that a coalition had been formed between the Democrats and Republicans in Oregon to defeat Grover in an election, but in the general election of the Democratic ticket, governor, congressman and all, there is little indication that any such coalition was ever entered into.
