The Sandersville Herald, Georgia, gives its view of the infamous, so-called civil rights bill which recently passed the U. S. Senate, and which we published in our last issue. It says:

On the 27th inst., at half past seven o'clock in the morning, an ignominious act was consummated by the U. S. Senate which is to bring discord and strife in many places. That infamous measure which has begun by Charles Sumner, the Civil Rights Bill, has passed the Senate. We do not believe it will make much difference here in our section, but is sure to bring trouble in some places, and must become a hobby for the demagogues, who are seeking place and notoriety. It yet remains to be seen if this bill shall pass the House of Representatives, and if it also passes, the section of President before it becomes a law. It is an honor to those who had their votes recorded in the negative upon the passage of this bill.

It will also be an honor greater than he has ever yet obtained, if President shall put his veto upon this bill in case it passes the House. But if shall become a law, it will not do us here much, only it will perhaps culminate in the death of a few impudent blacks, cause a few cases for the courts, and only hasten the downfall of the American Republic. When this law comes to be enforced then we are ready to become an imperialist, and will gladly help to tear down the existing fabric of the Republic, and to build a new structure upon a new basis, with the division of society into proper grades or classes. It will come to this as sure as the world stands, if this bill shall be forced upon the people, and we may as well express our honest convictions and intentions with regard to it.
