It is again our painful duty to chronicle the death of an old and highly esteemed citizen, Mrs. Mariam Cook, who was mother of the wife of our townsman, Mr. A. J. Apperson, in whose family she had her home sin e September, 1866. During her decline, no particular disease manifested itself. Old age had crept upon her, but not unnoticed. She had often during the present year expressed it as her opinon that she would not live through this year, and during the days immediately preceding her death, realized that her days were numbered, and that she was called to go home. Her last hours were peaceful, and she passed away on Tuesday morning, about 9 o'clock, without a struggle. Mrs. Cook

was born in Washington county, New York, in 1796. She married in 1815, and in 1834 removed to Batavia, Michigan, and 1861 came to Oregon. Mrs. Cook was the mother of ten children, Mrs. Apperson being the youngest. Six of her children survive her. She has had her children survive her. Land Warrants can be obtaind for services rendered before 1855, but not for services in the late war. Pensions for late war and war of 1812 obtained and increased when allowed for less than disability warrants, but no pensions are allowed to Mexican and Florida war soldiers.
