due to all soldiers who served in the  
army during the late war and who were  
discharged more than three hundred miles  
from home. Soldiers can depend on fair

When writing enclose stamp for reply and  
state company and regiment, and whether  
you have a discharge. Congress has ex-  
tended the time for filing claims for ad-  
ditional pay to July 22d 1874 for three years,  
and not to July 22d 1873 as heretofore.  
Land Warrants can be obtained for soldiers  
rendered before 1853, but not for services in  
the late war. Provisions for late war and  
pay of 1852 obtained and increased when  
allowed. For less than the entire amount,  
but no pensions are allowed to Mexican  
and Florida war soldiers. State of Texas  
has granted pensions to surviving veterans of  
Texas Revolution. New Orleans and  
Mobile Prize Money is now due and being
