CONGRESS AND THE TRAITOR.—The New York *Herald* publishes a full list of the Representatives and Senators in Congress, with their opinions on the third branch question. The *Herald* places all of the trimmers on the side of the third term party, thus making a majority of 16 in the Senate, and 66 in the House in favor of Grant's re-election.
