The Proposed Reduction of the Army.

We oppose it on purely home grounds, and call upon the Senators and Representatives of all States west of the Mississippi to take similar action. Sherman's "New England speech," or point out the humiliation of being forced to import foreign officers to drill cur raw recruits; we will not use the opinions of those generals who say if we had had a well diciplined army in 1861, the civil war would have ended in a skirmish; we will not call attention to the threatening attitudes of Spain or Mexico, but we will and do take the stand, that our homes are in danger from the Indians, and that as sharers in the privileges of this government, and as contributors to its wealth, we have a right to demand that the army be not reduced, and that our people, man, and not a purchaser upon credit stock and homes be defended.
