Denver sold dry goods, in 1875, to the amount of \$1,940,000; flour and grain, \$1,452,000; groceries, \$4,423,000; live stock, \$1,750,000, and paid \$107,000 at fairs, festivals, &c. The value of bullion deposited at the mint was \$757,259 31.

The banks sold during the year Eastern exchange to the amount of \$22,850,000. The average amount of deposits has been \$2,201,000.
