To do this requires a definite amount of capital to the acre just as much as the space within the factory wall needs to be occupied with the most approved machinery. Capital on Western farms is found to be the most productive, as a general rule, when invested in stock. Exceptional cases are common where surroundraising is the most profitable. To Clean a Rusty Plow.

Take a quart of water and pour slowly into it half a pint of sulphuric | grocery store shuts himself up, und acid. The mixture will become quite warm from chemical action, and this you forgot dem little ones.' is the reason why the acid should be poured slowly into the water, rather than the water into the acid, and let it remain on the iron till it evaporates. Then wash it again. The object is to give the acid time to dissolve one. the rust. Then wash with water and you will perceive where the worst spots are. Apply some more acid, and rub on those spots with a brick. The acid and the scouring will remove most of the rust. Then wash the mould board thoroughly with water | pencil are good in law. to remove all the acid, and rub it dry. Brush it over with petroleum, or other oil, and let it be till Spring. When you go to plowing, take a bottle of water to the field with you and apply it every bout to any spot of rust that may remain. The acid and the scouring of the earth will soon make it perfectly bright and smooth. If all iron work be washed off with petroleum as soon as we put our tools, ing circumstances show that grain implements, and machines aside for the Winter, it will keep them from rusting, and save a great deal of trouble and annoyance, to say nothing of depreciation and loss.—Rural
