Oregon City Seminary.

Last Friday a very successful term of three months closed at the Seminary.

ATTENDANCE. The attendance this year is larger than it has been for several years past. Many pupils, from fifteen to twenty years of age, that have not been in the gol for a year or two, are enrolled this year; and a few not previously in the school have come from other parts of the county and State. There are 44 pupils in the school over fifteen years The school has enrolled 251, and has had an average of 214. Mr. Worthington had an average of 43 Miss LaForest..... Johnson.....

primary department, of which Mrs. Johnson has charge, on an average, each room would have had an enrollment of 61. So far it would appear as though 37 of the pupils were absent every day; this by no means represents the true state of the case; for some of the pupils did not commence until near the close of the term.

THE SCHOOL HOUSE, The school house is well situated The location is high, healthy and accessible; and the building has five good school rooms. There is an air of neatness and care about the rooms which is very pleasing to a visitor. The rooms have been lately fitted up with the best patent seats and desks. They were ordered from Chicago for the town and are comfortable and elegant. Heavy cocoa matting on the stairs and in the room of the principal serves to deaden the sound and add to the appearance of the school room. The school has a good organ but the large number in attendance render it impracticable for all to meet in one

DISCIPLINE. What means the order, cheerfulness and happiness we behold in this school? It means that law, government, discipline are here. Are the pupils contented and happy? Perfectly so. Why? Because the pupils are so encouraged to self-control and self-help that occasions for discipline seldom arise. There ment this year. Not more than half a dozen cases, and the teachers have reason to hope that there will be still less

AIMS AND VIEWS. Well, the aim of this school is thoroughness. There is such a crying want of this thoroughness at the present day. It is pitiful to go into many schools and see how little the pupils know of the pages that lie before their eyes, as unintelligible as if they were written in Hindoo; how superficial they are; how they catch terms and names and the base language of rules, but comprehend not their meaning: how, if you take them from the letter. you find that they have no knowledge of its spirit or substance. But this school does not adopt the popular clap-trap about studying for mental discipline and about the unimportance of mere facts. If an education does not consist of more facts, it must consist of more fictions. Those who study for an object so indirect and indefinite as mental discipline can never be de cidedly successful. And those who teach with no other view, never more than half teach. The object, and the only object, should be to understand the subject studied, and if that under standing is attained, the highest mental discipling that the subject can yiel will surely come with it. This is the view of education taken in this school s simple, practical view, that leaves the individuality of each teacher unham pered, while it gives a clear aim to all and prevents any possibility of misdirected effort
