## Profits of a Paper Currency.

The Government is likely to make a

large profit by the loss and destruction of fractional currency. During the last two months, nearly \$2,000,000 of this sands of fish whose moral utility has alpaper currency has been withdrawn ways been doubted, and whose absence from circulation and silver coin substituted. The withdrawals have been entirely confined to the last three issues, there having been scarcely a dollar sent in from the first and second issues, although the government report shows \$7,400,000 of these issues still outstanding. It is more than likely that the greater portion of this amount has been worn out or destroyed. It is not the kind of money that people would be likely to hoard, and if it had been in metallic currency, people can hardly comprehend the amount of hard usage that the fractional paper currency receives. It is crumpled into vest pockets, allowed to become wet, is handled roughly, torn and defaced to an almost incredible extent. Seven millions of dollars seems a large amount to waste in this manner, but we have no doubt it has been done. Nobody feels the poorer for it, and it goes some distance toward paying the public debt.
