Boise, Judge, who beld that under the 11th section of the donation law, the Surveyor-General of Oregon was the officer authorized to ascertain where the lots were located which were sold by Dr. McLaughlin before the 4th of March A. D. 1849, and that the Preston survey and map of the city, with the monument's located by him, must control in ascertain-ing the boundaries of lots. We regard this as settling the uncertainty in refer ence to the matter, and t ust all our citizens will be able to conform without inconvenience to themselves in adjusting their improvements.
