Third-That all bands of Indians in the northern portion of Washington Territory be consolidated on the Columbia river, above the mouth of the Spo-

Note- Watkins recommends that all of the Colville reservation be restored to the public domain except a small strip ten or twelve miles wide adjacent to the Columbia river, as above indicated. 
