THE O. P. A. FACTOR.

The only active opposition to the purchase of the locks by the state came from the so-called Oregon Pacific railroad. And they had their motives no doubt. Who ever heard of a railroad company that was anxious to compete with free water ways? The only strange feature about it is that the railroad should have for its tools the representatives from the very section of the state that has heretofore urged most earnestly the purchase of the locks. Yet perhaps this is not strange when we consider the means which railroads do not scruple to use when they can find fertile soil to work. It is done. Record another corporation victory. The Oregon Pacific was the chief factor in the defeat of the bill. It was to its interest to defeat the bill and vigorously did it apply the means at hand. The representatives of the upper valley who danced to the fiddler's tune, will have the fiddler to pay with interest. Then will they return to the old tune and sigh for free waterways. The Oregon Pacific is a corporation. It, like all other railroads, will not hesitate to turn the screw when it can to the tightest notch, and the day will surely come when the upper valley will most earnestly desire that which a part of its representatives worked to defeat.

Having refused to buy the locks at this time the owners may safely take it for granted that the state will never buy. The new apportionment will give the control of the legislature to southern and eastern Oregon, and she will not vote to tax herself solely for the benefit of the valley. The provision that the state may buy, only extends to January 1, 1893. The state can buy them only for cash or at the owners' own terms, hence if the state intends buying them she must begin now to provide the wherewithal. This the present legislature will not do. There will only remain two more legislatures then to take any action upon the matter, as the one convening in 1893 will meet too late to take advantage of the option. This being the condition of affairs it is safe to conclude, 1st—That the state will never have as good an offer as she has rejected; 2d—That she will have to raise the money by a heavy tax, if at all, as she will have only three years at most to raise it in; 3d—That she can only buy at the owners' terms; 4th—That she will never buy. The last conclusion we believe to be the only tenable one. We believe too that it will be the best by all odds, not only for the company but for the county and city. The state's option will expire in six years; they can then convert the canal into a race and use it solely for manufacturing purposes, which will much more materially benefit this county than free locks.

The men who now control the water power here, not only have too much invested in the enterprise to halt now, but they have the determination to develop the latent power as rapidly as possible. The failure to sell to the state or secure a release of its right to buy, annoy, and most likely will deter as rapid development as would otherwise have taken place; but stop it, no.

The submission of the constitutional amendments at a special election is the only way to secure even an approximately fair ballot. It is almost impossible to separate the ballot from politics at any time, and at general elections never. We very much doubt if the care that has been taken to provide for a free expression will free the ballot from other, and corrupting influences. Whatever the result of the vote, whether at special or general elections, that is a mere fraction of the temperance work—the equal part. Laws are not self-enforcing. Officers seldom enforce a law which public sentiment does not back up strongly. Those who spout longest on the stump do but little of the real work. It is not time enough to determine this question after the amendment is carried, but to consider beforehand what means will result in the most good. As the people asked to vote upon this question the legislature did right in passing the bill, and we welcome a special election as more likely to result in a fairer expression of public opinion.

There was much rejoicing in the hall and lobbies when the house passed the Portland bridge bill over the governor's veto. Hand slapping was all in order for a few moments. Thus the governor learned that the question of bridging the Willamette at Portland did not reside in him. One active third-house man rushed to the governor's office and congratulated the honorable executive. It must have afforded his excellency but poor satisfaction.

The Iowa railroad commissioners have rendered a decision in accordance with the provision of the inter-state commerce bill. This is the first ruling under the bill.

Senate bill No. 33 provides new senatorial and representative districts. By its provisions Clackamas county is entitled to three representatives and one senator, also one senator jointly with Marion county. This county constitutes the eleventh senatorial district, and a part of the thirteenth. It forms the thirteenth representative district.

There seems to have been a general feeling on the part of nearly all the counties that they have not received their due proportion in the new division. Clackamas county, with her 13,333 population, should have had two senators without any joint business, yet we are assured that the members from this county did all they could to secure to this county her rights.

The old adage, "Do it yourself, if you would have it done," comes right home to us. We can if we will.

SALES LETTER.

SENATE CHAMBER, SALEM, February 15th, 1887.

EDITOR ENTERPRISE:

Such of your readers as take an interest in the affairs of state will be pleased no doubt to know that before this reaches some of them the fourteenth session of the Oregon legislature will be numbered with the things of the past. Yesterday was a busy day. Both houses held evening sessions. A number of bills were passed and several more introduced. There was a grand rush for the introduction of bills last night, caused no doubt by the fact that to-day is the last day that a bill can be introduced. There are plenty of bills already on their way through the legislature, and if one in ten reaches the governor and he puts his signature to them we will have plenty of law to last us two years. The prohibition amendment to the constitution will be submitted to a vote of the people, also one changing the time of holding general elections in the state to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. The present officers will hold over from July to November if the bill carries.

There will probably be a bill passed creating a railroad commission; but the people will not have the election of the commissioners—the governor will appoint them. The commissioners will have authority to examine the books of the various railroad companies, and be able to report to the legislative assembly what legislation it is advisable to make.

A bill has passed the senate which provides for election of a county recorder in several of the counties (Clackamas among them) of this state; the first county recorder to be elected at the next general election.

The new apportionment bill will become a law. It gives Clackamas county three representatives and one and one-half senators. Clackamas county will elect three years from next November (7), a joint senator with Marion county. In the meantime Clackamas will be represented by one of the senators already elected in Marion county, and Hon. L. T. Barn already elected.

A bill has passed the house enabling women to hold the office of school superintendent; also one providing that all examinations of teachers shall be public; also one obliging parents and guardians to send children of school age to school each year for twelve weeks, eight of which shall be consecutive, under a penalty of \$30; also a bill making kindergarten part of public school system; also a bill requiring school districts to hold five months' school before deriving benefit from state school fund.

Your readers can not help seeing that our legislators are alive to the interests of the public schools.

Legislative Sessions.

Of all the states which have substituted the biennial for the annual legislative session, Minnesota is the only one which exhibits the least desire to return to the old system. Such a measure has been introduced in that state, and public opinion seems to be divided on the subject, the Pioneer Press favoring and the Minneapolis Tribune opposing the annual session. Perhaps, after all, as one of these papers suggests, the evil lies not so much in the infrequency of the sessions as in the hastiness of the legislation.

It seems to be impossible to crowd into forty days the care and attention upon measures which can not be considered again for two years. Nearly five hundred bills, besides resolutions and memorials have been introduced at the present session of the legislature, which adjourns one week from to-day. Some of these are of vast importance, involving great interests, and far reaching in their effects. It will be impossible to do justice to all the subjects in the rush and haste of the closing days. The plan adopted in Michigan and other states, has been found to work satisfactorily, which fixes the salaries for each regular session, and limits the time for the introduction of bills, but not for the duration of the session. This has the advantage of discouraging undue haste in legislation and at the same time precludes the possibility of prolonging the session to any unreasonable extent.

Yakima Republicans: Orders have been received from headquarters to proceed at once with the new Northern Pacific railroad bridge at Kennewick. When this important bridge is built and the Cascade division is completed the Northern Pacific Road will be the finest and most thoroughly equipped trans-continental line on the continent. It is announced that the purpose is to have the entire line from Duluth, on Lake Superior, to Tacoma on Puget Sound including all bridges, completed and its running affairs fully adjusted, the present year. The Cascade division will be adopted as its main line, early in the spring, when trade, travel, commerce and development will take a vigorous start.

In the matter of the application for an appropriation of \$4000 to aid in building a bridge across the Willamette river at Oregon City. Petition from the citizens of Oregon City and the west side of the river having been presented to the court as well as a proposition from the parties preparing to build said bridge with recommendations from the Oregon City board of trade, and the court having listened to exhaustive arguments thereupon, and now, deeming itself fully advised, hereby orders and proposes as follows, to-wit: That upon the completion of a good, substantial iron and wire bridge eighteen feet wide, suitably adapted to the uses and purposes of teams and foot passengers, and completion of suitable approaches, being erected and built from the west side suspended across to the Oregon City side within the limits of the corporation of Oregon City, Oregon, the clerk shall and is hereby ordered to draw upon the treasurer of this county the necessary warrant for the sum of four thousand dollars.

Provided, however, that said bridge shall be fully completed and ready for travel by the first day of August, 1887, and provided further, that, before said order shall be issued to the said parties preparing to build said bridge, the court shall appoint some disinterested person who shall inspect the said bridge and report to the court that the said bridge is fully completed and is in accordance with the representations made by the court as to the pattern, quality and condition contemplated by said parties, and provided further, that such parties or company shall enter into a written contract with this county to the effect that if within any time within the next six years after this date the county court shall elect to purchase said bridge for the then actual value, to be assessed by three commissioners, one to be appointed by the court, one by the company, and the other to be selected by the two so appointed, then the county shall have the power so to purchase by paying such value less the sum of four thousand dollars.

Further ordered that the clerk procure book for record of surveys. In the matter of petition of W. S. Young et al for rebate of taxes against John E. Vinson, petition not granted.
