To the REPUBLICANS OF OREGON:
As the day of election approaches, it becomes necessary for every republican to do his whole duty.

The outlook for the success of the republican ticket throughout the State is highly flattering, still, at the same time it is very dangerous to rely upon this prospect and neglect to do your whole duty.

The democrats are on a "still hunt" and are making one of the strongest fights ever made in this State for the election of their candidate for Governor, and we are constantly in receipt of information that the democrats are now proposing to trade a vote for any candidate on the republican ticket, or for any local measure, in exchange for a vote for their candidate for Governor.

In order to overcome this you must be up and doing, and be so thoroughly satisfied and guarded that no such trade is on the part of any republican, and you should also see that your ballots contain the name of every candidate on the republican ticket, and that the name of no democrat has been substituted therefor.

Our greatest apprehension is that many of our republican friends will conclude that the ticket is safe, and that there is no necessity of attending the polls on the day of election.

No election has ever been held in this State at which every republican attended the polls and voted. It is safe to say that in every precinct of the State from three to ten republicans do not vote on election day.

There are in the State about six hundred precincts, and assuming that five republicans in each precinct do not vote this would deprive us of about three thousand votes that should be polled and counted for the republican ticket.

An election is generally like the verdict of a jury, quite uncertain until it has been rendered.

Hence, you will see the necessity of every republican going to the polls and casting his ballot for the entire ticket. With it we are safe. Without it we may suffer defeat.

Be kind enough to see and speak with as many republicans as you can, and urge upon them the necessity of setting aside all private business on the day of election, and of contributing one good and earnest day's work for the success of the "Grand Old Republican Party."

Let each republican in the State constitute himself a select committee of one, whose duty it shall be to do his utmost for the entire republican ticket prior to the day of election, and on that day to meet at every republican in his precinct and cast the entire ticket.

Let this, and we shall achieve a glorious victory at the polls on the 21st day of June next.

We must elect our whole ticket, which we can and will do if each republican is active and vigilant.

Our increased population will enable us to elect two Congressmen, and the State must be re-districted for that purpose. If the democrats should have a majority in the next Legislature, the State would be "Gerrymandered" as Ohio was, in 1842.

Should Gov. Penneyer be re-elected he would probably veto any bill restricting the State, that would fall to elect one democratic Congressman.

See that he gets no republican votes in your precinct, and that the Ohio experiment shall not be repeated in Oregon.

The burden of this work rests upon you. The old time loyalty of the party has not died out. It requires only an opportunity to make it manifest. This is the opportunity, and you now have a chance to show how much you can do for the success of the party.

Let us hear glorious results from your section, and on the morning of June 21 let a shout of victory ascend, and let it be proclaimed throughout the State that you have placed your disapproval upon democracy, and have recognized and rewarded honest merit and honest worth.

ASSAILING OUR INTERESTS.

Why should the Hon. Sylvester Penneyer go around over the State of Oregon persistently and deliberately misrepresenting the principal interests of Clackamas county and purposely creating prejudice in the minds of the people of the State against us?

This is precisely what he does. About half his stock in trade is the falsehood that D. P. Thompson is interested in the locks and wants to sell them to the State. Mr. Penneyer now knows this to be false yet keeps repeating it.

He asserts practically that the owners of the water power at Oregon City are a lot of scoundrels who want to rob the State, and implies that the way to prevent this is to elect him governor.

Now the people thus assaulted are our citizens. To them, and to them alone, the county of Clackamas owes its present unusual prosperity and its bright hope of the future. They have done nothing but what all good people in the county, democrats or republicans, think laudable and wise and right. We all want more of the same kind. But Mr. Penneyer, in order to gain a few votes, is willing to misrepresent us and prejudice the rest of the State against us, and against our most important interests.

We submit that no sensible democrat around here ought to vote for him. How many would, or should the republican candidate get, had he gone into the same dirty business? The executive of a great State ought to have more dignity, at least, if not more self respect, than to descend to such a means of getting votes.

WHAT IT MEANS.

Mr. Penneyer takes great pride in being a straight-out free trader. It is perfectly well understood that he wants to use the governor's office as a stepping stone to the United States senate. In the senate, which is always very close, he could have a chance to incorporate his free trade sentiments into the law of the land. If he did, our woolen mill must come to free trade wages, or stop. Our pulp mill must compete with Swedish and Norwegian on even terms, and our wages approximate theirs. And so with the paper mills.

Do our people understand fully what this means? The average wages in European woolen mills is less than half the wages paid in Oregon City. The wages paid in Swedish pulp and paper mills is less than one-third the wages paid here. Nor would the distance or freight afford any protection, for as long as we are in the market, freight will be nominal only.

And what would the Oswego Iron Works do? They have a hard enough time as it is. Take off \$6.70 per ton, the present duty, and then what? The moral of this is, don't elect free trade cranks to high office.

Does any laboring man believe that a man as bright as Penneyer is, can honestly believe that free trade and high wages can exist here together? It is impossible. He knows better. He is a rich demagogue and wants votes, but he does not care whether there are any manufacturing in the country, or what wages are paid.

Barney Goldsmith, the boodle manager of the democratic campaign, is warning citizens as a non-partisan to beware of republican boodles. The joke is too rich. It is a wonder that Barney knows what the word boodle means, he is so very innocent.

PETER PAQUET worked faithfully and well to change the assessment laws at the last term of the legislature, and it is not his fault that he did not succeed. The bill upon which he labored so assiduously would materially have benefited the people. If returned he will doubtless be able to push a bill through.

CLACKAMAS county should be proud of D. P. Thompson, and she is. Here he started in life. He chopped cordwood and shod mules here for a living. He developed here, and grew wealthy here. He is not a college graduate, but graduated at the very head of his class from the hard school of manual labor. None of our boys ought to envy, but every one ought to emulate him.

And here comes the name of Joseph Casto among the census enumerators. He is also virtually postmaster at New Era. The Lord only knows how many more federal papers he would like to suck while working for the defeat of the republican party from which he seeks and receives official favors. Here is a clipping from the Pacific Express: "Dr. Casto, of New Era, sends for 'Seven Financial Conspiracies,' saying that he is a new convert to the Union party."

SEVERAL of the democratic candidates have out printed cards with their names and the announcement that they are democratic candidates for office. Republicans who read these cards should bear in mind the fact that while those issuing them are pretty good fellows they are pushing their democracy. Their work is for the party that nominated them; their sympathy is with that party and they want to see the republicans defeated at the polls.

When Penneyer was running for you will elect me Governor, within ninety days thereafter not a Chinaman shall live on Oregon soil.

What contemptible demagoguery! Of course he knew he could do nothing of the kind, and he has never made the slightest effort in that direction. What has he ever done, anyway? Vetted the Portland water bill, forsooth! and signed two other bills of the same kind. Great man!

It is usual for the democrats of the campaign to depend largely for their stock in trade upon false reports and misrepresentations. So difficult have they found it to make a point against E. L. Eastham, republican candidate for senator, that they as a last resort have caused to be circulated a report that he had cut down the wages of the workmen on the basin. This is wholly false, and without the least foundation, as may be ascertained by any who will take the pains to inquire of the men at work.

OREGON has had bad luck with democratic administrations. The Grover-Chadwick administration stole the swamp lands. The present democratic supreme court causes the country to hold its nose. And now the recent developments at The Dalles land office lead to the strong suspicion that State Land Commissioner Penneyer, "Friend of the People," "Defender of the Faith," etc., has been assisting a gang of land thieves to steal state lands. But he declares he had none of the pork himself. "Turn the rascals out," and give Thompson a look at the books.

It is notorious that the democratic canvass in this county, and to a great extent throughout the State, has degenerated into a personal scramble for office, in which each candidate looks out for himself. They have no hope of electing their ticket, but want to get republican votes enough to run in one or two democrats. Republicans should stand by their ticket, remembering that these selfish democrats who now hope to be elected by the aid of republican votes, have never helped the party whose aid they now expect, but have always opposed it. Why should they be elected to office now in place of republicans who have always stood by their party?

It is said we are to have a nail mill in Oregon City. A public sentiment that would make Penneyer governor and U. S. senator would give us free trade as well. Common labor is \$2.00 per day in Oregon City, and 20 cts. per day in China. With free trade we would ship Oswego pig iron, if we had any, to China, have it manufactured into nails and shipped back here at so low a price that our labor could not compete at 50 cents per day. Penneyer knows all this. He is a very capable demagogue and wants votes.

MR. EASTHAM's competitors for senatorial honors have spent more than half of their time in the county canvassing and criticizing him for having got manufactures started here in the wrong way. We think the community is highly pleased that mills have been brought here at all. Could Myers or Vaughn have secured more mills or better ones by some other plan? The field is open. Let them go right on and try. Who is holding them? There is nobody in the whole county except themselves who thinks that either one has brains enough to comprehend the job—much less to do it.

HARVEY E. CROSS is a Clackamas county boy. He was born in a log cabin near Canby, and has lived all his life in Clackamas county. He is bright, intelligent, active and admirably qualified to fill the office of state senator. The young men of this county should take an especial pride in voting for him. Clackamas county citizens should prefer a man who knows and is identified with his interests to a man who is a stranger and cannot represent us properly because he lacks acquaintance. It will be eight years before this county again has the opportunity to elect two senators from her soil.

It is to be expected that Vaughn will believe with Penneyer in free trade. He was raised that way. And besides he may want cheap labor on his farm. Free trade brings cheap labor. But what shall be said of W. W. Myers? He claims to represent labor, and wants Penneyer for governor, and of course for senator. Now Mr. Myers either knows that he is thereby doing or else he does not believe that free trade means low wages in Oregon City. If he believes that free trade and good wages can by any possibility go together here, then he does not know quite enough to go in out of the wet. Stand up and be counted, William. Are you for free trade or not? If you have shaken free trade as you have shaken democracy why support Penneyer? Your party didn't nominate him. Has he promised you a pup?

The Eugene Journal hits the nail squarely when it says: "They talk about this being a campaign of boodles. And Barney Goldsmith, that noted anti-boodler, has published a card to the voters of Oregon, warning them to be on the lookout for corruption funds which he says the republicans are sowing broadcast over the land. That is about as good a joke as the attempt to slip into office as the enemy of untaxable bond bills, after having signed two of them, and as the enemy of rich men, when he is a very rich man himself. Satan rebuking sin would not be more ridiculous. Barney Goldsmith and Governor Penneyer warning the people against the use of money in this campaign! Why the air is full of the smell of the flesh pots paid for by Penneyer and sent out by Goldsmith. From the clatter and cackling that is going on all over the country it is plain to any observing person that the democrats are spending a great deal more money in this campaign than the republicans. Indeed, that is one of the campaign charges against Thompson harped on by the democrats and echoed to some extent by some dissatisfied republicans, that Thompson is not liberal with his money and is not spending anything like as much as he should, while Penneyer comes out liberally. The whole campaign of the democrats is based on buncombe, misrepresentations and absurdities. There is nothing in it."

WHAT WAS HIS FLAG?

The Oregonian has already made passing allusion to the fact that Mr. Penneyer was the one Northern governor who congratulated President Cleveland upon the issuance of the celebrated order returning the captured battle flags to the South. This incident in Governor Penneyer's official career is worth recalling, because, taken in connection with his espousal of the Southern cause with his voice and pen early in the rebellion, it proves that as a public man he lacks either good sense or good feeling. A man of Northern birth and breeding who would not stand up for the Union during the civil war might be a man of good intellect, in the legal definition of that term, but he must have been a cold creature, lacking that good feeling which makes a generous man stop chopping logic and throw up his hat for his country. A high local spirit sent thousands of Southern men, like Lee and Longstreet, into the armies of the Confederacy, but the plea in abatement for their wrong doing cannot be urged for Penneyer, who in siding with the South ranged himself in hostility to his section and in contempt of the opinions of his neighbors and friends. In doing this he was either a shallow partisan who believed the perpetuity of the democratic party was of more consequence than the upholding of the Union, or he was a man destitute of that glow of genial feeling which makes it impossible for one to be other than an ardent, aggressive patriot when the American flag is assaulted and the majority of his neighbors start to their feet to defend it.

The whimsicality of Mr. Penneyer's views, which have always made him an unsound and unsafe public guide, was signally illustrated by the fact that he at a time when the most famous leaders of the Northern democracy ceased to be partisans in their decision to be patriots, Mr. Penneyer was a sympathizer with the South, justified its secession, accepted its dogma of state supremacy and worshipped at the shrine of Calhounism. Of course a Northern democrat, who would do this at a time when such eminent democrats as Stanton, Dix, Butler, Brady, Dickinson, Douglas, Devens, Sickles, Logan, McClelland, Palmer and others were a unit for the prosecution of the war, was a man either too shallow to see that the obligations of patriotism were superior to the despotism of mere partisanship, or he was too cold to feel the contagion of local patriotism which made men of all shades of opinion on both sides, as a rule, go with their section rather than be compelled to shoot their own neighbors and fire their corn fields.

If it be said that "the war is over," we answer, "yes; but the war was a severe and lasting test of the citizen's quality, and that test Mr. Penneyer did not endure. He was against the cause of the Union, which was that of his own section, in that great time which tried men's souls. He was then as whimsical, inconstant, uncertain, lacking at a most terrible juncture in either good sense or good feeling, as he has been ever since and is to-day. He was with Fernando Wood, Vallandigham, Voorhees and Long at a time when the ablest and best men of the Northern democracy were with Lincoln. And this fact in the career of Mr. Penneyer hurts him in contrast with the action of Mr. Thompson, who from good sense and good feeling or both was a most stalwart defender of the cause of the Union. In 1863-'64 when the national armies in Virginia had waged a deliberate conflict only to meet with defeat, Mr. Thompson was not then a rich man, for there were few rich men in Oregon, spent his money freely for the flag.

Not a Proper Person for Governor.

If Governor Penneyer pleads ignorance of the selection of the indemnity lands he is not the proper person to be elected executive of the State of Oregon. In a governor of the State, sagacity is as necessary as honesty, and both are indispensable, for the public funds should not only be carefully guarded, but any and all schemes against the public weal should receive extra intelligent watchfulness. Hon. D. P. Thompson could not be duped into endorsing such a scheme as this, and during all his life, and he has filled very important fiduciary relations—his honor or his honesty have never been questioned or impeached.—The Dalles Times-Mountaineer.
