Look Out for Them. The secretary of state, who is ex-officio given. Address, Chas. Morinka, Mink, insurance commissioner, sends out word to look out for so called 'mutual benevolent insurance associations" that have agents canvassing the state for insurance on the assessment plan, but are unable to prove that they have sufficient capital to entitle them to a license to do business under the laws of this state. For the protection of the public, the in-Frank Neldon at Porter's blacksmith surance commissioner states that traveling agents of all duly qualified companies have licenses from the insurance agents. Persons professing to be such agents should be called upon to exhibit their licenses. Fraternal benevolent societies, such as Masons, Odd Fellows and Knights of Pythias, are not required to have licenses to grant such pecuniary relief as is authorized by their regulations but such societies do not employ tions, but such societies do not employ agents to solicit insurance.

Newspapers of the World.

The number of newspapers published in all countries is estimated at 41,000-24,000 appearing in Europe Germany heads the list with 5,500, then comes France with 4,100, England with 4,000, Austro Hungary with 3,500, Italy with 1400, Spain with 850, Russia with 800, Switzerland with 450, Belgium and Holland with 300 each, and the rest are published in Portugal, the Seandinavian and the Balkan countries. The United States has 12,500 newspapers, Canada has 700 and Australia also 700. Of 300 journals published in Asia, Japan alone has 200, 200 journals appear in Africa and 300 in the Sandwich Islands. In the principal languages there are published 17,000 newspapers in English 7,500 in German, 6,800 in French, 1,800 in Spanish and 1,500 in Italian. Germany heads the list with 5,500, then
