WASHINGTON LETTER. FROM OUR REGULAR CORRESPONDENT.

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THE INDIAN WAR VETERANS.

A Bill Relating to the Registration of the Old Fighters.

A bill has been prepared and presented by Mr. Minto, of Marion, and is entitled "A bill to amend an act to provide for the registration of the Indian War Veterans of the North Pacific Coast."

The text of the bill is as follows: Section 1. That the secretary of state of the state of Oregon shall record in a book or books.

Section 2. The certificate of the grand commander of the Indian War veterans of the North Pacific Coast shall be sufficient evidence of the service of the veterans.

Section 3. Whenever any person shall have registered with the secretary of state under this act, he shall be entitled to a certificate of registration.

Section 4. That the grand commander of the Indian War veterans of the Pacific coast shall be allowed out of any money in the state treasury.

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
