enforce this article by appropriate legislation. This resolution passed Congress February 28th, 1869, and has now been acted upon by twenty-two States. As there are thirtyseven States, the votes of twenty-eight are needed to pass the amendment, making six in addition to the number that have already acted. It is probable that the ratification of six other States will be accomplished by the first of March, and the amendment become by that time a part of the Constitution, which will remove the question from the coming campaign in Oregon as an indispensible issue, and render its ratification by the Legislature of Oregon a matter of no importance.
