Lynching Chinese at Los Angeles. The Los Angeles Evening Express. of Oct. 25th, contains an account of the affray among the Chinese, the interference of the police, the attack on the police force by the Chinamen and the lynching of Chinamen which fol-

lowed. An editorial, on the subject, is worded as follows: " All the dark scenes of early days in Los Angeles were entirely eclipsed by the horrible lynching affair of last night, in which some twenty Chinese met with a most cruel death, many of whom must have been innocent and inoffensive men. That the Chinamen who were engaged in the affray which resulted in the death of Mr. Thompson and the wounding of Mr. Bildarrian, and also the one who is reported to have fired promiscuously into the crowd, on Casswell & Elis' corner, sighly decerned by the corner. richly deserve hanging, no one can de-ny, but, the horrible, outrages and cruel manner in which innocent men cruel manner in which were treated at the hands of those gaged in the lynching, the full particu-lars of which, are too sickening and heartrending, and we do not wish to inflict our readers by publishing them, would have been a disgrace to the in-habitants of a cannibal kingdom, and cannot full to need the condemnation cannot fail to meet the condemnation of civilized and right thinking men. There is a Vigilance Committee in this city, but they had nothing to do with the horrible affair, but were the first to assist in restoring order, and the few Chinamen who were taken to jail for protection in spite of the efforts of the rioters to hang them, were under protection of prominent members of the Vigilance Committee."

GENERAL SHERIDAN.-The Chicago Post publishes the annexed: The New York World and the Chicago Times, the one out of ignorance, the other through malice, have attacked General Sheridan in connection with his conduct of affairs in this city with his conduct of affairs in this city during and since the fire. It may be well to inform the World that Sheridan has earned the admiration and the gratitude of the people of Chicago, without distinction of creed or party; that he did more to restore the public peace, reassure public confidence, and

peace, reassure public confidence, and drive from the city the horde of thieves and scoundrels that flocked to it from the east and west, than did all other men in authority. He positively refused to proclaim martial law, and nevfused to proclaim martial hw, and never for a moment placed the military power in the city above the civil. He mitiated the blowing up of buildings to check the progress of the conflagation, and in many instances, carried the powder and set the fuse himself. His conduct has been marked by courage, common sense, and manly simplicity, and whatever ignorant or malicious partisanship may have to say, Chicago knows her own mind upon this subject.

GENERAL GRANT'S PRESENTS.—Mr. Tilden alludes to President Grant as one "who has been cariched by costly presents while exercising the immense power of the Presidency." This is an unqualified assertion, made as if upon absolute knowledge, and yet, speaking upon all the information I have, I believe it entirely unfounded. The allegation is that since his election to the Presidency, General Grant has been the recipient of costly gifts: Returning from the war a victorious General, and holding no civil office whatever, he did receive gifts showered upon him ing from the war a victorious General, and holding no civil office whatever, he did receive gifts showered upon him by a grateful people, but he received them as the hero of many battles, and before he was even nominated for the presidency. His case was not solitary. General Sherman also receiveed munificent testimoninals; so did other Generals. General McClellan ran for the presidency four years before General Grant ran. He, too, was "enriched by costly presents," given, doubtless, in consideration of his military services, consideration of his military services, and his political opponents never cast foul aspersions on him for it. Wellington, after Waterloo, received presects amounting to more than two millions dollars. Wether heroes, in former or in recent times, have done well or ill in accepting tributes from their countrymen, is not however, the point here. Be that one way or the other, the right or wrong is the same in all cases alike; and since General Grant's accession to the presidency, as far as I can learn, he has never accepted a "costly present" from any one.—Senator Conkling.
