THE SHARP VERDICT.

Newspaper and Other Opinion Upon the Jury's Finding.

New York, June 30.—The sensation of the day is the finding of Jacob Sharp guilty of bribery. The result was hardly expected by the people at large. Judge Barrett says that this is by far the more important conviction as regards influence on public morality than even that of Tweed.

The Sun says: The verdict has cleared the air. It will be less healthy for boodlers and bribe-givers hereafter. Now for the next.

The World says: No false pity must deprive this great public of a victory of full value. A sentence of ten years imprisonment should be recorded against the convicted briber. Such punishment will do much good to kill the bold corruption in Washington lobbies. It will cleanse the state capital of a set of lobby rascals.

GOULD ON TOP.

He Squeezes Cyrus W. Field, and Gets His Elevated Railroad Stock.

New York, June 30.—The World this morning says: Cyrus W. Field turned over the remainder of his Manhattan stock to Gould yesterday. The amount was 20,000 shares, which, with 50,000 shares previously disposed of by Field, shows a total holding of 70,000 shares. The value of the block of stock at market prices before the downward movement was \$11,200,000. Field now has no interest in Manhattan and will retire from the board of directors. Gould will keep 50,000 shares to add to his own holding, making his total \$10,000,000. He will split up the block of 20,000 shares. This stock was subscribed for yesterday. Field claims that he got 120 per share for his shares.

JAY GOULD.

His Fine Italian Hand in a Deal for the B. & O. Lines.

New York, June 30.—President Bates, of the B. & O. telegraph company, declares there is no truth in the rumor current that the B. & O. lines have been sold to the Western Union.

A DIFFERENT STATEMENT.

New York, June 30.—E. S. Stokes says: "I believe that the story of the rumored telegraph deal is true, and that Jay Gould has finally secured the Baltimore & Ohio telegraph stock."

Maria Halpin's Husband.

New York, June 30.—Mrs. Maria Halpin, story of whose alleged relations with Cleveland in Buffalo was widely published during the presidential campaign in 1884, for political purposes by the Republicans, has been married. She lives in New Rochelle with her husband Albert Secord. During the campaign he was often mentioned as her uncle. He was an uncle to her former husband. Secord is beyond his 65th year.

MACKAY DENIES.

He Says he has not Been Scheming With Jay Gould.

New York, July 1.—It was rumored in Wall street yesterday that John W. Mackay and Jay Gould were in conference at the Western Union building, presumably in regard to telegraph matters. Mackay, who was found at the Nevada bank, said he knew nothing of any conference. "There is not a word of truth in the story. It is simply on a par with many others connecting my name with Gould's that have been floating about. It would take all my time to deny the yarns which have been started about me. I am not negotiating with Gould or anyone representing his interests with a view to cable or telegraph consolidation."

Jacob's Sentence.

New York, July 1.—District Attorney Nickoll says: "I don't want to be hard upon Sharp and I shall ask Judge Barrett to make an order for a medical examination regarding his condition. The result of examination will doubtless have an effect upon his sentence. The judge has unlimited discretion in the matter. He can sentence Sharp to one day's imprisonment and \$1 fine, or fix the maximum penalty of ten years' imprisonment and \$5,000 fine."

A Tobacco House Falls.

LOUISVILLE, July 1.—Dick Middleton & Co., proprietors of the Giant Tobacco Works, assigned to Fidelity and Trust Safety Vault to-day. They were manufacturers of chewing tobacco. Liabilities estimated at \$100,000; nominal assets. The failure is due to competition and close margins on profits.

Died "With an Honest Heart."

LOUISVILLE, July 1.—Albert Turner (colored) one of the murders of Jennie Bowman, was hanged this morning. From the gallows Turner said: "I am going to die with an honest heart and bring no one to the gallows. Free the man Patterson; he was not with me; I am willing to die now."

Heavy Death Movement.

CHICAGO, July 1.—Monthly deliveries of wheat to-day were very heavy. One firm is reported to have sent five million bushels of wheat belonging to local banks, and another firm disposed of seven hundred and fifty thousand bushels. The aggregate amount is tied up by litigation and cannot be estimated.

Stricken with Cholera.

DETROIT, July 1.—Patrolman Sanderson was taken suddenly ill last night and had to be removed to his home. Dr. Little, after a careful examination, pronounced his disease Asiatic cholera. This morning Sanderson is suffering terribly and is not expected to live.

Death of a Colored Bishop.

KENT, July 3.—Bishop James A. Shorter, of the African Methodist Epis-

copal church, having charge in South Carolina and Georgia, died suddenly of heart disease this morning at his home in Wilberforce, in his 74th year.

BLAINE AND SHERMAN.

The Ohio Senator Denies a Reported Interview—The Rebel Flag Question.

PITTSBURG, July 2.—Senator Sherman passed through this city this morning, en route from the East to his home in Ohio. In an interview he emphatically denied the statements about Blaine credited to him in a New York interview published in this morning's papers. He said: "I was not interviewed in New York. What appeared in the morning papers was manufactured. I was in a room at my hotel where a number of gentlemen talked, but was not interviewed. I never said Blaine was not a candidate for the presidency. I do not know whether he is a candidate or not, and certainly would not make such a statement unless I did know; nor did I say anything about his giving himself up to literature. Blaine and I are the best of friends, and it is unkind to put words into my mouth that I never uttered. Some persons say he may not have the same elements of support in New York that he had during the last campaign. As regards interviewing, all I ask is to be let alone."

"Is the rebel-flag question likely to revive during the next presidential campaign?"

"It will not be forgotten. It will rise up during the next campaign, and will likely play an important part. I can't say what were the motives of President Cleveland in issuing his order for the return of the flags. It may have been carelessness, but it was a serious question, that should have been handled cautiously."

THE JEWISH RABBIS.

The Coming Convention of Hebrew Rabbis in Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURG, July 2.—The coming convocation of the Rabbis of the Jewish church of America, which begins its celebration in this city on the 8th, will be one of the most important ever held in this country, and from the work already mapped out for action, its results will undoubtedly have lasting effect on the tenets of the followers of the Jewish faith in America. It is expected that there will be 250 delegates in attendance. Not only will the most eminent Rabbis be here, but they will also be accompanied by the presidents and leading members of the largest congregations in the larger cities. The chief work of the convention will be to endeavor to reconcile all existing differences between Jewish congregations and place them on the same level with regard to forms, ceremonies and services.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

A Descending Rocket Instantly Kills a Kingston Printer.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 2.—In connection with the celebration of the Canadian federation, a frightful accident occurred here last evening. A huge rocket was being set off, when the stick broke, and the missile, with terrific force shooting downward, struck Joseph M. Thompson, president of the Limestone typographical union, and almost decapitated him, his whole neck being torn away, and from the explosion that followed his breast was frightfully mangled. Ten thousand spectators were horror-stricken, and dispersed. Several other persons had narrow escapes.

THE WESTERN UNION ON TOP.

The Baltimore and Ohio Telegraph Lines Said to be in Gould's Hands.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The World says that it is a fact that Robert Garrett's presence in the city on Thursday night was used yesterday as an argument to support the rumored closing of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad telegraph deal. While here he had a conference with Ives' people and yesterday his lieutenants had a consultation with Henry S. Ives and others. Well informed men in Wall street are convinced that everything is up and it is asserted that the deal has been, practically settled with the Western Union on top.

THE VACANT BENCH.

The Cabinet Said to be in Favor of Elevating Lamar.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—The president has discussed the question of elevating Secretary Lamar to the supreme bench with all the cabinet officers, Lamar of course excepted, and they have expressed general satisfaction with the proposition. It is stated the appointment has been fully decided upon, provided a good man can be secured for the interior department.

DON'T TALK WITH REPORTERS.

Jake Sharp's Condition Unchanged—His Faithful Wife.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Jacob Sharp was a little more gloomy to-day than he has been, but no material change in his condition beyond that. His wife attends him both day and night. She is much stronger than he is, but is subjecting herself to a very great strain. Sharp's only callers are his counsel, physicians and family. Acting under the advice of his counsel he does not talk with reporters.

A Small Chicago Riot.

CHICAGO, July 2.—A gang of non-union dock laborers engaged in loading schooners were set upon this afternoon by a number of members of the seamen's union and a pitched battle ensued. The mate of the vessel, John Yale, was beaten to insensibility with clubs and may die. Several non-unionists were badly cut and bruised. Some of the rioters were arrested.

Vanderbilt Starts Around the World.

NEW YORK, July 2.—This morning Wm. K. Vanderbilt, with his wife and three children, passed Sandy Hook on his costly steam yacht, Alva, for a cruise around the world. If the plans as now arranged are carried out they will not see these shores again for nearly three years, and will spend about \$15,000 per month in traveling expenses while away.

ALBANY NEWS.

Report of the Discovery of a Rich Gold Mine—The O. P. Round House.

ALBANY, Or., June 30.—Information has been received from Brownsville that a party consisting of N. Standish, Geo. Dyson, and J. Moore, of that place, have discovered a rich gold mine thirty miles southeast of Brownsville between Calapooia creek and McKenzie river. The vein is said to be five feet wide, of intermingled hard and decomposed quartz. Parties from there state that they obtained from one panful of decomposed quartz a teaspoonful of gold of shot-like character. A flour sack half full of the rock has been sent to Portland for assay.

Hon. Allen Parker, a member of the firm which is to start a salmon cannery at Yaquina, referred to recently, has left for San Francisco to purchase the necessary machinery for the plant. The contract for furnishing the brick and building the Oregon Pacific round house in this city was let to-day to J. S. Clark & Sons, of Albany. The building will be composed of brick and contain eight stalls. It will cost about \$12,000. Work on the building will be commenced immediately. The brick is already burned and ready for use.

RAILROAD RUMORS.

The O. & C. Gap Closing Up—The Milwaukee & St. Paul Presidency.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—The end of the track on the California & Oregon is now within a very short distance of the summit tunnel. The present terminus at Cole's is to be made the basis for operations until connection is made with the line at Ashland.

Rumor is in circulation that Vice President Van Horne, of the Canadian Pacific, is to be the next president of the Milwaukee & St. Paul system.

Miners Still Entombed.

VIRGINIA CITY, June 30.—10 A. M.—Although the rescuing party has remained at work steadily up to this hour, they have not succeeded in making connection with the 1500-foot level, and the fate of the entombed miners still remains unknown.

Fire in the Oregonian Office.

PORTLAND, Or., June 30.—There was a still alarm at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The fire was in the Oregonian office. No damage.

THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC

It is Called to Account Under a Provision of the Interstate Commerce Law.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—A complaint was sent last night to the interstate commerce commission by two ticket brokers of this city, charging the Southern Pacific company with unjust discrimination under the interstate law. The facts in the case are that a few months ago a Mrs. Randolph purchased in New Orleans two round trip tickets to California. She signed both tickets, although one was for a friend. When the ladies decided to return, Mrs. Randolph went to the office of General Passenger Agent Goodman, of the Southern Pacific company, to have the tickets stamped for a return trip. The clerk noticing the same signature on both tickets refused to honor them. Mr. Goodman being called in, is said to have written on the back of the ticket belonging to Mrs. Randolph's friend: "This ticket is good if the bearer is accompanied by Mrs. Randolph." Mr. Goodman's acts held to be a violation of section 3 which provides "That it shall be unlawful for any common carrier to make or give any undue or unreasonable preference or advantage to any particular person or persons whatever."

The law provides a penalty not exceeding \$5,000 for each offense.

THE LILY.

She Loves the Yankees and our Free Country, and will be a "Citizen."

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—The Examiner this morning prints a reputed interview with Mrs. "Citizen" Langtry, which is quite interesting in many places. Her declaration of intention of becoming a citizen of the United States was induced because she was weary of the effete monarchies and tottering despotisms of the old world, and a desire to share in the responsibilities and glories of this mighty republic. She fancied that the queen and Prince Albert turned pale when they read their papers yesterday morning and learned that she had gone over to the Yankees. The Jersey Lily declared that if she were to stop here she would be a republican. She announced she was opposed to introduction of British free trade into our country, and was quite vehement, so the interviewer says, in her declaration that the Chinese must go.

TOPOLOBAMPO DUPES.

A Diet of Mush Straight, and Smallpox for Company.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Grubbs, with nine children, have arrived here from Topolobampo, and give a very mournful account of their experience in this modern Arcadia. They arrived there January 6th, and their provisions and \$400 in money were turned into the common fund, but they managed to save enough to carry them to Guaymas. Before the family left, the children fed only on mush for three weeks. When the smallpox broke out there was very little medicine and much heartlessness prevailed. The people remaining there are suffering great destitution.

A HEAVY CONTRACT.

The San Francisco and Northern to be Extended to Ukiah.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—The contract was signed to-day to grade the extension of the San Francisco & Northern railroad from Cloverdale to Ukiah, assuring the extension of the road to that point. The contract calls for the completion of the work by August of next year. It will be

one of the heaviest pieces of grading in the state, the contract calling for nearly 4,000 feet of tunneling.

PORTLAND NEWS.

Fire in the Chinese Theater—Lecture by Kate Field.

PORTLAND, Or., July 1.—The fire department was called out at 8:30 this evening. The cause of the alarm was a fire in the Chinese theater, at Second and Alder streets. Damage slight.

Miss Kate Field lectured at the New Market to-night to a large audience.

ALBANY NEWS.

The Oregon Pacific—The Jefferson Ferry—An Accident.

ALBANY, Or., June 2.—The excavation for the Oregon Pacific round house began to-day. A large number of hands will be employed and the work pushed rapidly forward. The contract for constructing forty-five miles of the road eastward of Albany will be let during the coming week. G. W. Hunt and several other railroad contractors will be bidders.

D. B. Allen, formerly of Shelton, Nebraska, has bought the ferry at Jefferson. It was owned by W. P. Ross, of that place, and was sold for \$4,500. Mr. Allen will remove from this city to Jefferson with his family in a few days to take possession of the ferry.

Frank Countryman, while working yesterday upon a woodshed, fell from the building a distance of about twelve feet, receiving severe, though not serious, injuries.

Mrs. Chas. Pierce returned home to-day from Independence, where she was called by the sickness of her uncle, Samuel Goff. His illness terminated fatally and the funeral occurred yesterday.

PORTLAND NEWS.

The Alaskan Time Beaten—A Small Fire—Band Concert.

PORTLAND, Or., July 2.—The steamer Telephone left this city at ten this morning for Astoria, for the express purpose of beating the time made by the Alaskan last Saturday, which she succeeded in doing, making the run from dock to dock in four hours and 34½ minutes, beating the Alaskan's time in a trifle less than twelve minutes.

The Mullen tunnel on the N. P. R. R. has been repaired. The train arriving to-day was the first through since the big cave.

A small fire occurred at two this afternoon in a dwelling on Seventh and Alder streets. Damage small.

The G company drill squad leaves for Tacoma to-morrow, accompanied by the Dodworth band.

An immense crowd attended the concert given by the Second Cavalry band at the plaza to-night.
