With a "go ahead until we stop you" signal from Lieutenant-General J. L. DeWitt and some good, hot days ahead, this might be a logical time to visit the Oregon coast.

From now until the middle of June the flowers are at their best. The roadsides are lined with Scotch broom, and unless you have actually seen a hillside covered with this plant when it is in bloom you cannot appreciate its sheer beauty. Drive along the coast highway south of Yachats when the sun is setting on the flowering hills. You'll not soon forget it.

But I really started to tell you about the rhododendrons, which are the pride of the coast. Tall trees bloom profusely, with a particularly vivid pink flower. They have just started to bloom and will be colorful for at least a month.

Those who live in this vicinity know that you can leave for the coast in a blazing sun and arrive there about two hours later to find the beach many degrees cooler, so it is well to take a leather coat or windbreaker. And, if yours is a sensitive skin, beware of a cloudy day, for some of the worst cases of sunburn result from overexposure, despite an overcast sky.

There are several excellent highways from Camp Adair to the beach. One by way of Dallas, will be discussed later, as it is obviously impossible to describe the whole coastline in a few paragraphs.

This week we are suggesting the loop trip from Corvallis to Alsea and Waldport, thence north to Newport and home on the Newport-Toleda highway, or the reverse.

On the Alsea road you wind over the Alsea mountain, with an excellent view of the Willamette and coastal valleys. Farther on you catch glimpses of the Alsea river and if the time is right the fish may be biting.

There is activity galore for anyone at the beach. Marine gardens are numerous and the color of the many aquatic plants is amazing. The best known are the jade-colored sea anemones and gold and maroon jelly fish.

The sea lion caves near Yachats are fascinating and attract hundreds of visitors each year.

Agates are found in large quantities both north and south of Newport. Another curiosity is the green Japanese float, many of which are found on the beaches each year. These are clear, green glass balls which the Japanese use for their fishing nets. However, due to the army's suggestion that civilians beware of picking up strange objects on the shore, better be sure it's a float and not a mine you've just found.

Golfers will enjoy the Agate Beach golf course a few miles north of Newport. In the past the Newport lighthouse has been a popular place, but it may be that visitors are not so welcome with war restrictions.

The auto courts and hotels are numerous and good. Write ahead if you want to be sure of reservations at any especial resort.

May is considered one of the best months to visit the ocean, so plan to go there soon. Here's wishing you a sunny day and a calm, blue sea.

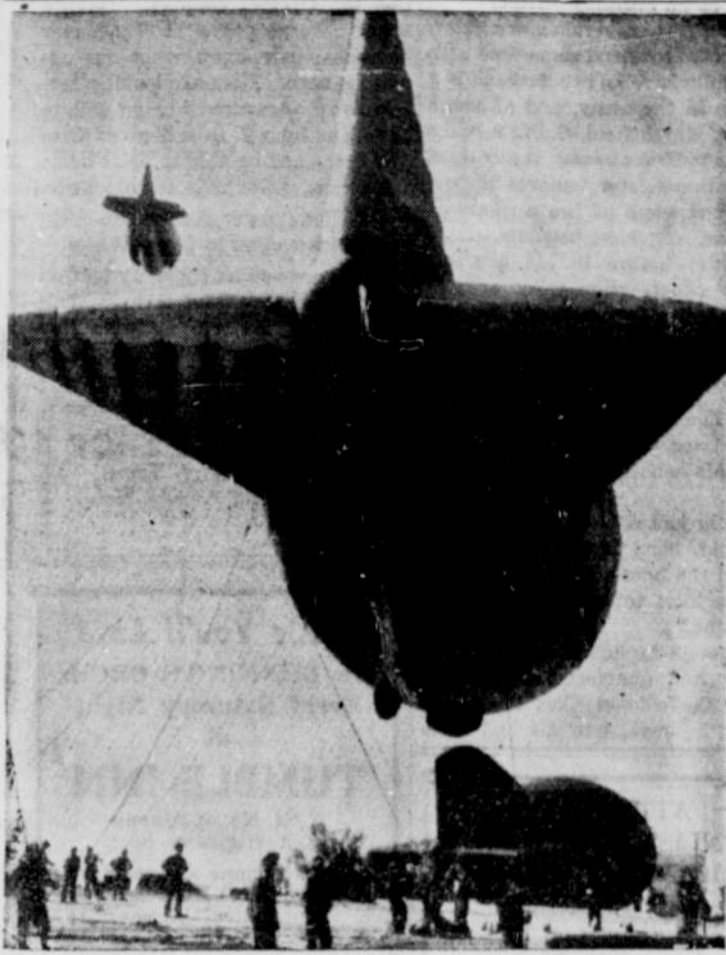
