Many will plan to go to the famous Oregon beaches for the week end, though it is advisable to have reservations in case of an overnight trip.

At Independence there is planned an old-fashioned celebration, with parades, speeches, athletic events with prizes and the Browning Amusement company, carnival rides and attractions.

At Salem, the program will be at the fair grounds, beginning with a big soldier dance Friday night.

The Calapooia Round-Up will offer three days of old west with wild steers, bucking and roping, races and special patriotic events. Crawfordsville, scene of this celebration, is west and somewhat south of Camp Adair. To reach it most easily, take the Albany-Eugene highway south from Albany and turn east at Halsey through Brownsville and on up the beautiful river to the grounds.

## **Highway Labor** Shift Is Split

### Crews Take Afternoon Off While Camp Adair Traffic Is Heaviest

Work is going forward on the highways on east and west sides of Camp Adair and some slowing of traffic has been the result. Grading is in progress at both jobs and there remains much more to be

On the west side the crews are working 11 hours a day. In order to interfere as little as possible with Camp Adair traffic, the shift is split at 4 o'clock in the afternoon until 6 o'clock. Then the crews return and work until 9 o'clock, Corvallis Program leaving the highway clear of construction work from 4 to 6 o'clock during the rush hour after shift at the camp.

There have been at least two serious accidents along this stretch of construction work, caused, engineers say, by excessive speed. They ask that all driving the road use due caution and care and forget the hurry for a time.

### **Evening Run to Carry** Army Men Into Town

### Col. Shuman Is **New Med.Officer**

### Veteran of A.E.F. Is Here to Assist Col. MacCallum's Group

Lt. Col. John W. Shuman, Sr., arrived at Camp Adair last week from Camp Lockett, Calif., and will serve here as chief medical officer at the station hospital with Col. MacCallum. Col. Shuman was post surgeon at Camp Lockett.

Col. Shuman's experience as a medico has been varied. It has been interspersed with army service since he joined the Iowa Naitonal Guard at the tender age of 15. He was born in Washington, Ia., in 1885 and got his early education in that state. He took an A. B. degree from Geneva college, and was later given an honorary degree of Dr. of Sc. at this college. His medical education was at the University of Pittsburg, where he participated in glee club, football, basketball and track on the varsity squads. His internship was served at the Presbyterian Alleghany General hospital in Pittsburg.

Before the other war, Col. Shuman practiced medicine in Sioux City, Ia., specializing in internal medicine and consultation until he was commissioned a captain June 15, 1917. He served overseas a year during which time he was promoted to major. He had front line service in the Vimy sector for six weeks, including some valuable experience in surgery.

Following the war, during 1922-3, further overseas service saw Col. Shuman as professor of medicine at the University of Beirut, Seria. He retained membership in the medical reserve corps of the U.S. army and upon his return to the States, he practiced in Los Angeles, where he has resided until the present call.

At the College of Medical Evangelist, Los Angeles, Col. Shuman was associate professor of medicine. He was also senior attending physician at the Los Angeles coungames of league play.
