Eastwood, owner, did not leave the mill until 10:45. Two Southern Pacific freight cars on the siding there also were burned. Mr. Eastwood stated the building and equipment was lost, and was not fully insured, although he carried insurance on the contents.

Referring to the loss and his plans for the future, Mr. Eastwood stated he would like to keep the feed business going, although building priorities and other matters must be considered before he can tell just how far he may proceed regarding rebuilding. The mill was first built in the Habit in One Jump year 1875 and was one of the city's landmarks. In 1877 H. F. Fischer purchased an interest in the company, the old flouring mill, and conducted it up to the time of his passing. His sons, A. W. and Fred Fischer, also were associated with the business.

The building was three stories high and in that early day had a manufacturing capacity of one hundred barrels of flour in 24 hours. Steamers from Portland carried the stock to the mill and away to the buying centers.


