

Pro. Wrestling Has Debut in Ice Arena

\$100 Battle Royal Is Booked for Next Week

More than 250 enthusiastic fans saw three exciting professional wrestling matches Wednesday night at the Kirkham ice coliseum in Corvallis, when Elton Owen, promoter, brought the sport to Corvallis for the first time in several years. Mr. Owen refereed the matches.

Jim Lawson, local representative, told the crowd that the new arena would be prettied up a little more hereafter. He said work would be done on the parking grounds as well as the accommodations inside.

A battle royal, the winner of which will receive a \$100 victory bond, was announced as part of the card next Tuesday night.

In the curtain-raiser, Kaiser and Olsen staged a fast, clever and scientific match to a draw, each taking one fall and each fall taking the same time, 12 minutes. The remaining six minutes was without a fall. Olsen was announced as Pacific coast champion at 168 pounds. He made a statement between falls that he was proud of his title and would do all he could to keep the game clean and out of the alley fight class.

Bulldog Jackson, veteran of local ring fights and well-known here and in Portland for years, took the second match with two hammerlocks after his opponent, Tex Hager, took the first fall with a flying toe hold. Jackson showed his traditional not-in-the-rule-book tricks, among which he brought up a handfull of dirt from the floor after taking a dive out of the ring. He smeared the dirt in Hager's eyes and face, leaving a mark like sandpaper. He was as unpopular as ever.

Ernie Piluso and Buck Davidson staged the main bout at 180 pounds, with Piluso taking the match after Davidson had taken the first fall with a Boston crab. Piluso was the favorite with Davidson showing a disposition to play outside the rules.

An excellent card was promised for next Tuesday night, with the battle royal as a feature. Mem-

bers of the Corvallis post of the American Legion took care of the business end of the show.

Women Will Be Part Of Army Organization

Organization of the Women's Army Auxiliary, which was authorized when President Roosevelt signed the bill for its creation, introduced by Representative Edith Nourse Rogers of Mass., was begun immediately. The purpose of the corps, the first of its kind in American military history, is to enlist women volunteers for military service with the army to replace, and release for combat service enlisted men who are now performing certain non-combatant duties.

The corps, while not a component part of the army, is the only women's organization, except the Army Nurse corps, authorized by law to serve with the armed forces. Units of the corps may be called upon to serve in zones of operations, as well as in the continental United States; but only in non-combat duties. It will not be used to replace the civil service employees now working for the war department.

Ultimately the corps will take over the major part of the aircraft warning service, numerous army administrative duties and whatever other suitable tasks its members can fulfill. It will be under military discipline, with uniforms and insignia, living quarters,

food and medical and dental treatment provided by the government.

Under the terms of the bill, the corps may be expanded to a total of 150,000 women, if and when necessary. General enrollment will not begin until after an officer and non-commissioned officer cadre has been trained, a matter of approximately three months. Formation of this officer cadre began at once.

The procedure of application and selection is as follows:

Officer candidates must be citizens of the United States, between the ages of 21 and 45. They may be married or single. They must have had at least a high school education, be in good health and of excellent character.

In order to secure a representative group of women from the entire United States, recruiting is to be on a regional or corps area basis. No applications sent to Washington can be given consideration.

Applications must be obtained, in person, from the local recruiting station and when properly filled out, must be returned, in person or by mail, to the appropriate main recruiting station.
