Off to the west where the hills are rolling lies the H-Bar-H ranch, where dudes ride through the valleys and pastures in the coast range and drink in the soothing scenery of green fields, forest-clad mountains and lofty Mary's peak.

Since its establishment several years ago the ranch has been a popular meeting place for large and small groups of people, partaking of its many diversions.

Horses will be found to your satisfaction whether you are an experienced rider, or have never known the aches that come after the first horseback ride. Moonlight rides are often planned, as they have been popular with the patrons.

Manager of the H-Bar-H is Nicolai Ivan (Nick) Krikorianz, and the telephone is Philomath 755, although the address is Wren, Oregon.

The ranch house is a remodeled farm house which has been comfortably furnished with rustic paneling. Heavy modern tavern-type tables and chairs make an attractive dining room, and colorful draperies add cheerfulness to the rooms. One room has been especially fitted with a bar, where beer and light drinks are sold.

Another favorite gathering place is the glassed-in porch, where groups gather to rest and enjoy the scenery.

Camp Adair workers have already discovered the ranch, as recently Dewey Martin, head of "General Installation," was honored at a dinner and dance there. Steak dinners are especially recommended, although the food is all good.

Riding and dancing, the latter in the ranch barn, are not the only activities. A practice teeing ground is just being completed, and badminton may be played. Mo-skeet shooting and ping pong are also available.

As typical of most dude ranches, patrons are urged to come in simple and comfortable sports clothes, riding habits or levis. Formal clothes are definitely out. Riding clothes are usually worn during the day and sport clothes are worn in the evening.

Both weekly and week-end rates, including lodging, meals and riding, are available by writing or telephoning the management. It's a good idea to make your reservations ahead of time.

Accommodations may be had in the ranch house or in individual cabins with fireplace, private bath

and twin beds. Beautyrest mattresses are used throughout.

If you wish to know how to find it, follow the coast highway to Newport and turn to the right where the sign points to Wren. You can see the buildings on the hill a few miles past Philomath. H-Bar-H is 11 miles west of Corvallis, 96 miles southwest of Portland. To complete our statistics, it is one hour's drive from there to the ocean.

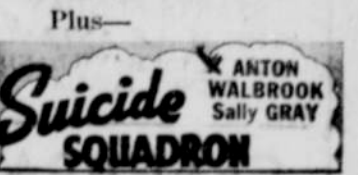
