To illustrate: If the John Doe family has four members and at the time of registration had 50 pounds of sugar on hand, they would not have received the war ration books. They should ration themselves as follows:

On hand on May 4 the family had 50 pounds. The four members were allowed two pounds each to begin

with, a total of 8 pounds, leaving 42 pounds on hand. During the next four periods a total of 16 pounds were consumed, leaving 26 pounds. In the fifth period two pounds each per person was rationed, leaving 18 pounds.

They can use the two pounds extra per person between now and August 22, leaving 10 pounds. In the period 6, extending to August 22 eight more pounds are allotted, Sugar rationing began May 4. leaving two pounds. The family The designated ration periods and should then apply to the board for
