**More Welders Needed On Jobs in Shipyards**

**Training Given Free By Federal Agencies**

Workers who are finishing their jobs at Camp Adair—and their wives—may now get training for war jobs in this vicinity through the free classes in welding being conducted on a 24-hour basis both in Albany and Corvallis.

These classes in vocational training, financed by the federal government, offer an opportunity for non-defense workers to transfer from their jobs to vital defense industries. Shifts in the schedule of classes are planned so that workers may take the training and still hold their present jobs. Shipyard jobs are then available after 2½ to five weeks training, depending on individual ability and the number of hours per day spent in training.

A total of 9000 welders are expected from the training centers by November, calls indicate. Women may also enroll in these welding classes.

Instruction in ship joinery and marine electricity is also available to men and jobs await completion of the training. New classes in

steam fitting will be available if students wish them.

Information about this program and any of the vocational training classes may be secured at the offices of Federal Employment in Corvallis and Albany. Registration may also be completed at the employment office at Camp Adair.

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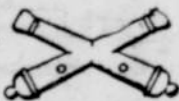
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**TO SHARPEN YOUR MILITARY I. Q.**
