It is managed by Private Morris Arnovich, who has played ball with Philadelphia, Cincinnati, New York Giants and other big league aggregations. The Lewis quintet of pitchers is headed by Pvt. Cy Greenlaw, who has taken leave from the Boston Red Sox until America wins the war. Other hurlers include St. Sgt. Fred Smith, Kansas City Monarchs; IFC Joe Albanese, Yakima star, and Don Mymer, formerly of the California state league. The team boasts three crack catchers, including Sgt. Reuban Litzenberger, Portland; Pvt. Al Eull, Minnesota

state league, and Pvt. Bill Beard, Seattle Rainiers.

Others from the far north, all rated tops, are Sgt. Wunn Pintarell, Nebraska state league; PFC Billy Sehaske, Wisconsin state league; PFC Harvey Clutter, California state league; Pvt. Billy Sewell, Washington State college, and PFC Schultz, Wisconsin state league.

The committee in charge, just by way of going on record with a pure, 100 per cent soldier recreation fund benefit, announced that every adult entering the ball park on Saturday night would be required to purchase at least one 50 cent ticket, the regular admission price. This, the committee said, "includes ball players, managers, score-keepers, newspaper men, soldiers and the committeemen, of course. And to the glee of many a red hot baseball bug, it will also include the umpires. The gatekeeper will be required to pay for the privilege of unlocking the gate and the radio announcers will have to pay for their participation." In short, there will be no ducats, according to those in charge.

Another feature, and one that might well pack any man's major theater, will be an all-soldier, all-star big-time vaudeville show, introducing a galaxy of new Camp Adair talent in a one-hour rapid fire performance. This event will take place just before the commencing of the ball game and will be presented from an especially constructed stage between home plate and the pitcher's box.

The big evening of entertainment and baseball will start promptly at 8 o'clock at the ball park with a band concert by the Camp Adair military band. This will be preceded by a down town parade routed to Central field and led by the army band.

Red Cross Services Help in Emergency

Contacts With Family And Cash Loans Help

The men wearing the ARC cut-outs and the insignia with the red cross in a white circle are representatives of the American Red Cross, the staff of the Camp Adair field office. Their job is to make Red Cross services available to the enlisted men and officers stationed at Camp Adair and nearby points. Almost any problem, if it concerns the soldier, and particularly if it concerns his family, may be taken to the Red Cross. In most instances the Red Cross can help.

The emergency loan of the American Red Cross, while only incidental to the other services offered, is important to the soldier. Loans can be made only in cases of emergency and only at the request of a commanding officer.

Private Doe received a wire from his family stating that his mother was critically ill. At the request of his commanding officer the Red Cross field director wired the Red Cross chapter in the soldier's home town for verification. The reply stated that the doctor recommended that the soldier come home, and an emergency furlough was granted. Private Doe was broke and at his C.O.'s request the field director made him a loan for his round

trip ticket and expenses enroute. A number of soldiers were red-lined at their former station because of the transfer to Camp Adair. Some of them arrived broke and needed money for laundry, cleaning, smokes, etc., and a number of small loans to meet these needs have been made at the request of commanding officers.

No interest is charged on any loans made by the Red Cross—there is no charge for any service given by the organization.

The services of the American Red Cross at Camp Adair are available to every soldier and every officer in the area. They are offered, not as a charity, but as a service made available on the basis of the Congressional charter establishing the Red Cross, and as provided by army regulations, particularly AR 850-75 and W. D. Cir. 179-8/23/41.
