P. S. This service applies only to necessities! Not for that morning after head or tummy ache from those six cheeseburgers you decided to go to sleep on last night. For these ailments, the regular "sick call" report will continue to suffice.

Camp People Invited to College Museum

One of the points of interest in Corvallis is the College Museum (Hornor Museum), on the State college campus. The public is invited to see the exhibits, and a special invitation is extended to the men of Camp Adair.

The museum contains some twelve thousand articles of wide variety, appropriately grouped in the following divisions: Historical, Antique, Indian, Art and Oriental, Biological, Geological, Guns and War Trophies, Curios, etc. Of particular interest is the collection of fluorescent minerals. These are shown in a dark room, under ultraviolet light, which penetrates the minerals—excites them and causes brilliant colors to appear. All visitors should see this exhibition, and may do so by request at the office.

The museum is located on Jefferson street, in a group of trees, opposite the college armory; entrance on the east side of the building.

Visiting hours are 10 to 12 and 2 to 5 on regular week days; 2 to 5 on Sundays and holidays. Admission free.

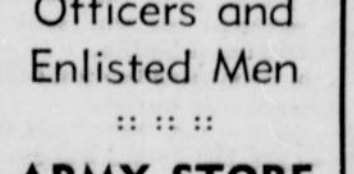
