

Independence Leaders Hear How Adair Runs

Military Activities Described By Officers of Service Command

First in a series of Camp Adair military activities were given to members of the chamber of commerce at Independence Tuesday evening by seven officers who were special guests for the organization's monthly meeting.

Col. George C. Ferch, executive officer, represented Col. Gordon H. McCoy, camp commander, who was unable to be present. The camp commander's office, Col. Ferch pointed out, has charge of all activities connected with the camp, except the actual training of troops. This department was also described by Captain C. B. Forsman, assistant executive officer.

The intelligence and internal security division not only keeps a close watch over the post, but cooperates with civic and police authorities of nearby communities, it was pointed out by Major Ralph E. Riordan, director.

Post Exchange stores supply men with items not issued to them, as well as soft drinks, candy, food during afternoons and evenings, and other wares, it was stated by Major Rudolph Ayres, post exchange officer. Profits from the stores go to company funds for the enlisted men.

The varied program of entertainment, morale building, athletics and other activities of the special services division was described by Captain A. P. Ruth, special services officer. He urged that people of nearby cities extend hospitality to the men, but said that "pampering" was not desired, either by soldiers or the officers in charge. Companionship in a real home occasionally was recommended as the greatest contribution civilians could make.

The intricacies of the post motor pool, from which all vehicles are dispatched, were told by Captain Harry G. Kurtz, motor transportation officer. A rigid program of conservation of gasoline and rubber is conducted by the army, he stated, and no waste or inefficiency

in the use of cars, trucks or other vehicles is tolerated.

The post public relations program, which has as its aim establishment and continuation of friendly relations with the camp "neighbors" as well as the general public, was described by Lt. George H. Godfrey, assistant military intelligence officer and post public relations officer. Lt. Godfrey also described preparation of copy for the Camp Adair Sentry, weekly newspaper of the post.

Greetings and an invitation to come to Independence at all times were extended by Mayor M. J. Butler. James Hart, president of the chamber, presided and welcomed the officers to the city.

Bus Lines Station Now Open at Camp

Schedules Increased To Nearby Points

Camp Adair's bus terminal, in P.X. No. 1 at 1st St. South and Hoskins Ave., is operating at full swing and definite schedules now have been set up. Mrs. Ruby Curtis, head of the Camp Adair Terminal, announces that six ticket agents will be on duty to take care of the routing of Adair soldiers.

Busses operate through the camp from Corvallis and Albany, go via the Hospital unit and the camp depot. On the present schedule, the busses leave Albany and Corvallis beginning at 5 o'clock in the morning, run on frequent intervals throughout the day until the last bus leaves at 12:45 o'clock the next morning. Busses leave Camp Adair for Albany and Corvallis beginning at 5:30 in the morning, and the last bus leaves at 1:15 the next morning.

Busses now maintain a regular schedule through Salem and Camp Adair, passing through Monmouth and Rickreall en route. Busses leave Salem beginning at 4:30 o'clock in the morning, and the last bus pulls out at 11:45 o'clock at night. The first bus to leave the camp depot goes at 5:35 o'clock in the morning and the last, at 12:50 the next morning.

Portland buses are the only ones which generally do not make a call at the depot. They stop, before, at the junction of the west gate and highway 99W. Busses for Portland leave beginning at 7:25 o'clock in the morning; the last bus

leaves at 5:50 o'clock in the evening. One bus, at 1:15 in the afternoon, does leave directly from the depot. On the return trip from Portland the first bus leaves at 7:30 o'clock in the morning, the last at 9:30 o'clock in the evening. On Sunday a special bus leaves from Portland at 11:30 o'clock in the evening.

Soldiers using the busses will have their passes examined at the depot on outgoing busses only. Busses coming in will stop at the West Gate for a pass check.
