New Post Field House Now Available to All

Definite Events Will Be Scheduled Shortly

The Camp Adair Field House gymnasium is now open and available to all enlisted men who feel the urge to stretch and flex a few of those unused muscles.

The field house will undoubtedly be one of the most popular recreation spots for the men of the post. Completely modern in every respect, the building, located at 1st Street South and Avenue "F," is of ample size to accommodate all of the indoor athletic activities for the personnel of the entire post. While it is yet too early to announce a definite schedule of events, the field house will be the scene of divisional championship matches and "play-offs" of every indoor sport but it will open at all times during regular hours for all men who care to use the facilities.

At present, equipment is on hand for those who wish to play basketball, work out with punching bags and for boxing and wrestling. Future plans for the gymnasium call for such equipment as parallel and suspension bars, tumbling mats, rings, weight lifting machines and all other installations necessary to completely equip the gymnasium to the smallest detail.

The field house is now open, daily Monday through Saturday from 1000 until 2200. Fatigue is permitted, and usually worn, but only sneakers, regular gym or tennis shoes are permitted on the floor.

Portland Grid Games Free to Service Men

Portland is really getting a hand for their continuous and ever-ready welcome to service men visiting the "City of Roses."

Latest bit of information that Portland has again dusted off the welcome sign comes with the announcement that football games played in the Multnomah Civic Stadium in Portland next Saturday between OSC and WSC are free for all enlisted men in uniform. The first and last Saturdays during November, the 7th and 28th, are also gratis to enlisted men.

Only one request is made in connection with these games. The committee asks that all service men taking advantage of this invitation secure their tickets at stadium gate number 22 only.

Friday Night Game Free to Soldiers

Enlisted men will be admitted free to the Oregon State Rook-Oregon Frosh football game here Friday night. Tickets will not be necessary for the service men and they will sit in the upper deck of the south stands. This section will be reserved for service men in uniform and they should enter at gate 7.

The west stands will be open to general admission, faculty ticket holders and high school students. General admission holders will enter at gates 2, 3, and 4; high school students at gate 5; and faculty ticket holders through gate 6. General admission will be 75 cents and high school duets will sell for 25 cents.

Knot Hole club members will sit in the lower deck of the south stands and should enter through gate 7. Oregon State students, as usual, will occupy the east bleachers.

SECOND GUESSING with Sgt. E. A. Brown

Although the present football season already has had more ups and downs than the elevator pilot in the Benton hotel on Saturday night, each section of the country still has its unblemished cleven—sheer luck, though.

No part of these United States has a monopoly on this state of affairs, although the middlewest and south apparently are in for one of their better years while out here in our own back yard—the Pacific coast—well, what do you think?

Santa Clara, with Corvallis' defending champions, Oregon State, as their latest victims, have won four in a row, and should Buck Shaw's Broncos get past UCLA on Saturday, they may go on to an unbeaten season. But that is far from a foregone conclusion. In the first place, UCLA is going great guns after a poor start, and in the second place, Santa Clara has to play the California pre-flight aggregation the following week. The coast cadets are also unbeaten to date, and plan on staying that way.

The eastern stalwarts at this writing are Boston college, 7 to 6 victors over the North Carolina Cloudbusters, Army, Syracuse and Penn. These are all good clubs. In the south the money is riding on Georgia, Georgia Tech and Alabama; the southwest has Texas Christian and Tulsa, while there is a major power stalking behind virtually every goal post in the middle west.

That's where such teams as Ohio state and Illinois are building up spotless reputations with Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, Notre Dame and the Iowa pre-flight cadets in close pursuit. For that matter, Northwestern and Minnesota are not too far off the pace.

Notre Dame, as could be expected, regained its place in the top drawer Saturday by tearing apart the previously all-winning Seahawks, 28 to nothing on the passing of Angelo Bertelli and the plunging of Jerry Cowhig.

Buckeyes Breeze Along
The victory was only the second of the year for the Irish while the defeat was the first, following wins over Minnesota, Northwestern and Michigan, for the Seahawks.

Illinois, with its first defeat under Ray Elliot's coaching still in the future, brushed past Iowa, 12 to 7, with Guard Alex Agase blocking a punt that brought the Illini their first score. Ohio State, voted the nation's best in the Associated Press poll last week, had little trouble with Purdue, 26 to 0.

Michigan subdued Northwestern, 34 to 16, with Tom Kuzma in action for the first time this year; Minnesota bounded back after two straight losses by downing Nebraska, 15 to 2; Wisconsin, with sophomore Jack Wink running 101 yards for the payoff touchdown after intercepting a pass, stopped Great Lakes, 13 to 7.

Missouri turned Bob Steuber loose for touchdown runs of 44, 35, 70 and one yards to crush Kansas State, 46 to 2.

UCLA, with one of the best forward walls on the coast, dominated all the way in shoving California out of the title picture with a 21-to-0 verdict, and Southern California scored its first win of the season, 26 to 12, over previously unbeaten Washington State. Mickey McCordie plunged for two of the Trojan markers.

Texas had it all its own way while drubbing Arkansas, 47 to 6, and Texas Christian made a third-

period touchdown by Van Hall stand up for a 7-to-2 victory over once mighty Texas A. & M. Tulsa, its goal line still unscathed, conquered Washington of St. Louis in a Missouri valley fracas, 40 to 0.

That score was duplicated by Georgia in its surprisingly easy triumph over Tulane, a team with victories over Southern California and Rice. Georgia Tech also remained unbeaten by manhandling Davidson, 33-0.

Captain Joe Dommanovich, another of the year's crop of good centers, was the hero in Alabama's 8-to-0 defeat of Tennessee, while Mississippi State and Bloddy Black mutilated Vanderbilt 33 to 0.

Alvin Dark, playing after dark, broke away on runs of 70 and 46 yards as the Louisiana State Tigers trimmed Mississippi, 21 to 7. The halfback also helped set up the winners' third marker.

Captain Joe Muha, a pulverizing fullback, ended Clark Shaughnessy's honeymoon at Maryland by taking the old liners' T model apart, 29 to 0. It was the fourth straight blanking administered by the Maryland military cadets.

Army Mashes Lions
Two other members of the southern loop stepped outside for their opposition and returned with impressive victories, North Carolina halting Duquesne's unbeaten string at sixteen, 13 to 6, and Duke retaining its jinx over Colgate 34 to 0.

Army, striking with the regularity of a grandfather's clock marched all over Columbia, 34 to 6, with Captain Hank Mazur starring as the ball carrier and the cadet line charging so fast Columbia's famed Paul Governali had six aeriels intercepted.

Dartmouth awoke in the second half to spill Harvard, 14 to 2; Fordham revived from its early season difficulties to trim West Virginia, 23 to 14; and Navy had to apply the pressure to subdue Yale, 13 to 6.

Princeton's George Franke and Bob Sandbach almost brought the Tigers a victory over Pennsylvania's powerhouse, but the Quakers, heavy favorites, rallied in time for a 6-to-6 deadlock; Syracuse remained unbeaten with a 10-to-0 decision over Holy Cross, while Billy Hillenbrand of Indiana escorted the Hoosiers to a 19-to-7 win over Pittsburgh.

Boston college, its line easily handling the pro-sprinkled stars of the Cloudbusters, outplayed the young aviators all the way and only a blocked kick in the final two minutes made the score close. A lethargic Villanova eleven counted twice in the fourth to beat Florida, 13 to 3.

Bob Kennedy Retains High Scoring Place

Although his team lost to California Saturday, Bob Kennedy, Washington State fullback scored a touchdown to hold his lead among conference football players. His total is 32 points in four games.

Randall Fawcett, Stanford, moved up to second with 24 points, by scoring three touchdowns in his team's rout of Idaho. Other leading scorers are Bowman of Montana; Londo, Washington State; McCorkle, Washington; and Akins, Washington State, all with 18 points.

Oregon Shifts Backs For Saturday Game

"Honest" John Warren, University of Oregon coach, asserts he will start a newly organized back-field combination against the University of Idaho at Eugene on Saturday. Oregon did not play last Saturday.

Under the new lineup Tommy Roblin, former left half, will start at quarterback; Bob Reynolds at left half, Scotty Deeds at right half and Bill Davis at fullback. Oregon is a heavy favorite to win.

"RABBIT'S FOOT?"

It looks as if Camp Adair brought luck to the Rose Bowl champions of Oregon State College. At the University of California game, attended by a large number of Camp Adair officers and enlisted men, the College pulled off a thrilling finish for the benefit of the numerous visitors in uniform. In the two games played since then, without benefit of Camp Adair's attendance, O.S.C. has not fared so well.

Jimmy Bivins, Cleveland's slugging Negro light heavyweight, invaded the heavyweight ranks again Tuesday night to take a close decision from Bob Pastor of New York before some 11,000 customers in a Cleveland arena.

The Red Cross announced in Washington that Cronin would manage one of its overseas leave clubs for American military men, but didn't say to which of its overseas operations he would be assigned.

Cronin didn't say where he was going either, declaring he didn't know what his job would be or what the plans were other than that he would go to Washington Monday for preliminary training.

He explained that the Red Cross

contracted him during the world series and they would like to have a "chat" with him.

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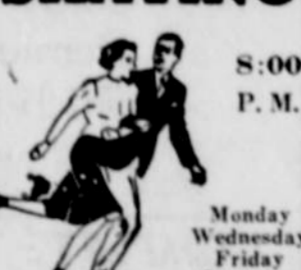
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
