Before she may keep certain items, a WAAC gal must have served at least six months, but that doesn't apply to panties or brassiere.

Finds Food Perfect And Prices to Match

Now that it's at your disposal, the Sentry investigated to find out what you liked most among the things that are offered by it.

Of course we're talking about the newly-opened Service Club Cafeteria at the No. 2 Club house. It opened last Saturday morning at 7 o'clock and has been doing a "land office" business ever since, according to Miss Carrie Reedy who is in charge.

No effort was spared to provide a modern restaurant-cafeteria, equipped with every convenience and staffed with competent personnel. Well over a hundred persons can be accommodated at one time, and the doors are opened from 7 a. m. until 10 p. m.

Miss Reedy said that the most popular morning snack was the familiar "donuts and coffee," all for a thin dime. Coffee at any time is a specialty, and the hostess added that she always samples the first cup, and if it isn't up to specifications, has more coffee made.

Steaks are another specialty... with cube steaks at 40 cents, chicken fried steaks, 50 cents, and T-bone at 60 cents.

If you drop in for lunch, a daily plate special will be transferred from their side of the counter to yours for 35 cents and plate dinners at night, cost 40 cents.

Sunday dinners, starting at 12:30

o'clock cost 60 cents with a salad and coffee included with the entree and vegetables.

The fountain service is operating now, but is at an "in-between" stage of completion... it will be moved out into the new addition on the north side of the building.

The cafeteria is located in the north wing of Service Club No. 1, on Club Avenue at First street North.

Salvage Trucks Scour Camp in Scrap Drive

Colored Man Rescues Wounded Navy Ensign

Epic Tale of Valor Told in A.P. Report

The heroism of a mess attendant in saving wounded sailors is chronicled in an Associated Press account published widely in the United States.

"A young naval ensign," says the account, originating in Hollywood, "told today how a powerful Negro mess attendant swam for six hours through shark-infested waters, towing to safety a raft loaded with wounded seamen from a U. S. destroyer sunk by the Japs off the Solomons.

"Wounded in the legs and face, the ensign was drifting, aided by a seaman, when they sighted one of the destroyer's Gregory rafts. With Adrian and his companion clinging to its sides, the raft started drifting seaward. Then the messman stripped off his clothes and tied a line about his waist.

"The ensign warned him against chancing the shark-infested waters, the Negro responded, 'I'm gonna tow this old crate in. Just keep telling me if I'm going the right way.' "Six hours later a barge sighted the raft near shore, and the seamen were taken off. They rushed to a hospital and never learned the hero's full name."
