Shuttle Bus System Operating on Post; Nine Miles for 5c

Shuttle-buses, providing inner-camp transportation on a regular and convenient schedule, are now in operation during all necessary hours of the day.

This service, doubly important now that the season of inclement weather has arrived, provides an adequate and economical means of transportation for soldiers, civilian workers and others living off the post as well as a quick means for those whose duties call for frequent trips within the camp. Thus far, one Wood and Hart stage has been sufficient but as the need increases more shuttle buses will be added to handle the inner-camp traffic.

Under the present schedule, shuttle buses meet all incoming stages at the Motor Bus depot, (between Hostess and Club avenues on 1st st., South) from 5 a.m. until 9 a.m. The shuttle service is discontinued from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m., then resumed, meeting all stages until 1 a.m. each morning. The shuttle route, about nine miles, is covered in approximately 20 minutes, giving service to all sections of the post, the hospital section excepted. Passengers for that area from the south are given direct service by the Corvallis-Albany bus while passengers from the north are given transfers at the bus depot via southbound buses.

Shuttle buses are plainly marked as such, and the fare to any stop on the route is only 5c. Although shuttle service has been available several days, publicity and definite information concerning routes and time schedules has been withheld until the experimental trial runs were completed.

Pastor Quits Ring To Join Armed Forces

Bob Pastor, who twice fought Joe Louis and long a heavyweight contender, Monday announced his retirement from the ring for the duration and said he planned to enlist soon in some branch of the armed services.

The 28-year-old veteran of 12 years in the ring, during which he had 70 professional fights after 87 starts as an amateur, conferred with his manager, James J. Johnson, and they decided "the war is more important at this time than a boxing career," Johnson said.

Pastor lost a 16-round decision to Louis before the latter became heavyweight champion and later was knocked out by Louis in 11 rounds in a title fight.

Belgium Twice Ravaged by Germany, Will Rise Again

This is the second in a series of articles, giving highlights in the history of the United Nations.

Belgium, a victim of German aggression in both great wars of our century, has been an occupied country since May, 1940. Sweeping across the borders without warning, Hitler's gray hordes overwhelmed a small nation which had made scrupulous effort to remain neutral in a Europe at war. An army of more than 500,000 — one Belgian out of every sixteen was in it — fought gallantly until German numbers and German airpower made further resistance useless.

King Leopold III, who led his troops, is now a prisoner of war at Laeken. But the Belgian cabinet had gone to France before the army surrendered and from London still directs colonial affairs and carries on the war as one of the United Nations. Many Belgian units are fighting with the British army. Many of Belgium's merchant ships have been sunk, but the rest carry supplies for her allies.

Belgium is the most densely populated country in Europe, averaging 712 people to every square mile. Although only a little larger than the state of Maryland — 11,775 square miles — it has a population of 8,386,000, more than four times as large as that of Maryland. As a result of this overcrowding, the Belgian people have always had to be industrious and thrifty to survive. The cities of Brussels, Antwerp, Bruges, and Ghent have been celebrated for great artisans and fine craftsmen since the Middle Ages.

While there is excellent agricultural land in Belgium, three times as many people work in factories as work on farms, and the country in peacetime imports much of its food. The tradition of commerce and manufacturing is an old one: Antwerp has been a great port for centuries and the rich coal supply of the Wallon region stokes the furnaces of industry. With this coal and imported iron ore Belgium in 1937 produced 3,700,000 metric tons of steel. Other large industries are textile-making and cement manufacture. Glass from Belgium shines in the windowpanes of many of England's homes. Before the war, Antwerp and the Flemish provinces ranked first in the number of diamond cutters in the world.

The people of Belgium speak two languages: French in the southern areas, Flemish in the north. Both languages are spoken in Brussels, the capital, a splendid metropolitan city of 900,000. The bombing of Brussels marked the opening of the German invasion of 1940.

Romans, Franks, Burgundians, Spaniards, Austrians, Frenchmen, and Dutchmen have at various times held sovereignty over Belgian soil. But out of Belgian culture have come such artists as Rubens, the van Eyck brothers, Memling, Van Dyke, and Breughel, and the poet Maeterlinck. Modern Belgium became an independent nation in

Just Begun to Fight He Says, on Navy Day

Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, speaking in New York in a Navy Day address to the nation Tuesday evening said that the Navy of the United States had "hit the enemy some savage blows and we have just begun to fight." Secretary Knox pointed out that U. S. shipyards are now turning out merchant ships faster than the enemy can sink them, and added, "he isn't sinking them so fast any more either."

Knox mentioned many facts, more favorable for the allies now than ever before but to correct an impression that he was being too optimistic the secretary closed his address by saying, "We have a long and agonizing road ahead of us and the price in blood and treasure will be staggering."

Throughout the nation, in almost every village and city, Navy Day this year was the inspiration for public rallies and patriotic gatherings to commemorate the founding of our modern navy. In every case, War Bond Sales were stressed and many cities have reported record-breaking quotas filled. The day was also marked by the special induction of thousands of new navy recruits featured in parades along with other members of Uncle Sam's armed forces, auxiliary and civilian defense groups.

With U. S. naval units now operating in almost every sea on the globe, the nation's observance of Navy Day on this occasion was directed to the all-out effort of winning this war.
