## Thrice-Sunk Beavers In Montana 'Breather'

### Despite 13-0 Licking 'Huskies Met a Team'

Coach Lon Stiner and his thrice-defeated Oregon State football team returned to Corvallis Sunday from their 13-0 defeat at the hands of the University of Washington Huskies for a week of intensive drill for the Montana game on Dad's day this week end. The Montana contest is generally looked upon as the only thing resembling a "breather" on the state schedule, but the Grizzlies are conceded a fair chance of staging an upset.

Commenting briefly on the Washington game, Stiner remarked that the Beavers played good ball throughout the encounter. He also had high praise for the performance of some of the players.

"Once again, we just weren't a lucky ball club," Stiner said, adding, "Outside of the two scoring plays, statistics show that we battled them on even terms. However, we have no alibis for the loss," he concluded.

Commended for their work in the game were Center Bill Gray, Tackle Lloyd Wickett, Fullback Joe Day and Halfbacks Bill McInnis and Lee Gustafson. Bob Libbee, suffering from a recurring back injury, was only able to participate in one play at left halfback. George Zellik, regular left end, was forced to remain at home, not having recovered from injuries received in the Washington State game the week before.

## SECOND GUESSING with Sgt. E. A. Brown

As a general rule the powers that be in the boxing game stagger around in shorter circles than the fighters they claim they are protecting, but every so often—probably just to keep us all confused—they do come out with something worthwhile.

Not the least of these all too few about faces is the announcement by the National Boxing Association that boxing titles would be "frozen" for the duration. This means that champions in uniform will not have their titles appropriated by self-declared champions or by dictum of any individual athletic commission.

After getting this bit of business out of the way, the NBA through its president, Abe J. Green, solemnly announced that Cpl. Billy Conn and Bob Pastor are the "logical contenders" for Sgt. Joe Louis' heavyweight crown. Then followed by saying that ranking fighters now in the armed services would be placed in a special "honorary class." It's all very confusing.

**Ignore Status**

In ranking Pastor as the leading "out-of-the-service" heavyweight, the board ignored both his recent defeat at the hands of Jimmy Bivins of Cleveland and Bob's announcement a week ago that he was retiring from the ring to join the army.

The NBA explained that Bivins' win over Pastor was registered after the October 19 deadline for contests to figure in the ranking. Bivins was listed as the No. 2 light heavyweight.

Melio Betina was placed at the top of a group of five "outstanding boxers" in the heavyweight class, but the board noted that his army service probably would prevent any ring activity on his part. This, apparently, leaves all competition up to Tami Mauriello, who slapped down Lee Savold last Friday night.

**One Change**

Manual Ortiz, whose victory over Lou Salica has been recognized by the NBA, was ranked the No. 1 bantamweight for the only change in title classifications in the new ratings. Henry Armstrong, the old "perpetual motion" specialist, came back to gain fourth slot among the NBA-ranked welterweights, coming behind Freddie Cochrane, Ray Robinson and Fritz Zivic. This is a bit confusing inasmuch as Armstrong recently defeated Zivic in San Francisco in the most significant step of an amazing comeback campaign.

## Defense Areas Barred To Civilian Nimrods

Civilian hunters with firearms must not enter territory located in the immediate vicinity of army and navy installations, Jerrold Owen, state civilian defense co-ordinator, warned Wednesday.

Major-General James I. Muir, Fort Lewis, Wash., in a letter to Owen said he had requested civil authorities to prevent any hunter armed with a shotgun approaching within 500 yards of any military installation and to bar all hunters armed with a rifle, pistol or revolver from entry within one mile of any military installation.

Officials of the Oregon state police and state game commission said they would enforce the edict in all hunting areas of Oregon where military or naval establishments are located.
