## Four Hot Tilts At Field House

Gull vs. Mountaineer Inf. League Torrid Go; Spec. Troops in Game; Give League Standings

In two roaring games tonight and tomorrow evening at Field House, some kings may be slid off the haystack in the now red-hot league basketball series underway among teams of the 104th Division.

Following games played Monday night at Field House, the battles for leadership have settled down to a steady roar.

Only in the Infantry league is a shining star holding bright. Mountaineers of the 414th kept their record clear by scoring their fourth straight intra-division win at expense of the Pill-Rollers (329th med.), by a 46 to 9 trampling.

Closer was the Artillery League game between 386th EA and Div. Art., in which the 386th Boneheads fought into a first-place tie with the fast-traveling Red Legs, by beating the Generals, 35-21.

### Tonight At 1800

Tonight at 1800, second-place Gulls of the 387th may gain on the Mountaineers, provided they can trip the Engineers of Infantry League in the first Field House game of the evening. A prime Special Troops tilt looms at 2000, when the Balls o' Fire (804th Ord.) try to snipe the Snoopers (104th Rec.), who are now in second place tie with the Storekeepers.

Tomorrow evening, at 1800, leadership of the Special Troops League will be in jeopardy, when Hq. Co., topping the league 3-0, staves off challenge of the Storekeepers (104th QM), who have won a pair, lost one.

They've won three and dropped one, but can be tied by either the Bees (385) or the Boneheads (386th), should these fast fives win their next game.
