Christian Science Churches  
"Mind" will be the subject of the lesson-sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, February 21.  
The Golden Text will be, "The Lord of hosts hath sworn, saying, Surely as I have thought, so shall it come to pass; and as I have purposed, so shall it stand" (Isaiah 14:24).  
Among the citations which will comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "Sing unto the Lord; for he hath done excellent things; this is known in all the earth. Cry out and shout, thou inhabitant of Zion; for great is the Holy One of Israel in the midst of thee" (Isa. 42:5, 6).  
The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Thou shalt have no other gods before me" (Exodus xx.3). The First Commandment is my favorite text. It demonstrates Christian Science. It inculcates the tri-unity of God, Spirit, Mind; it signifies that man shall have no other spirit or mind but God, eternal good, and that all men shall have one Mind" (p. 340).
