

Hq., 921st, Hold To 96th League Firsts

It had to happen sooner or later. As the sixth week of the 96th Division's championship cage tournament roared by, the three way first place tie up in the Kane League was broken when the high and mighty five of the 2nd Bn., 381st Infantry took a nose dive at the hands of the 1st Bn., 382nd Infantry. This leaves the 96th Division H.Q. Company and the 1st Bn., 382nd Infantry still fighting it out for the lead.

Tech. Sergeant Howard Berge, 530 guard of the 96th Division Headquarters squad, earned his keep in last Friday night's game when he led his spirited team mates in a 36-24 triumph against the 321st Engineers. Dispelling the old feeling that big men are slow men, Berge, who has to knock the snow off his nose every morning, ran long-legged circles around the Engineers until the competition looked like that they had dropped their picks and shovels. Even though his defensive position in past games has prevented him from taking a primary place in the line light of the high scorers, Berge managed to get around the net throughout the setup and knocked off first place with 9 points.

In the Easley League, the M.P. Platoon, despite the loss of big Bill Reeder who was laid up with a sprained ankle, subdued Sevier, who heretofore has starred at forward, in the center position and made a fourth rally to eke out 27 points against the 15 of the 1st Bn., 381st Infantry. Timber Wolves Defeat 96th in 'Big Games'

Identical Scores Both Games, 58-38

'Wolves' Hit Stride With Passing Attack

With identical, "believe it or not" scores, the Timber Wolf basketball team clipped the 96th Division in their "big game" at Field House. In a prelim, the Div. Hdq. outfit outbattled the 921st FA team of the 96th.

The scores — 58-38 — for both games! One would suspect collusion, had the action not been so fast, furious and the scoring so well diversified.

It was a fitting and climactic duo of melees, marked by presence of both the artillery bands of the 96th and the Timber Wolf divisions, plus a lusty, roaring crowd of rooters for both divisions. Among fans who perhaps helped put the Timber Wolves over the top was Major General Gilbert R. Cook and his daughter, Ce Ce, who have been ardent rooters for the squad all season long and Brigadier General Bryant E. Moore.

Div. Hdq. Smoothies
In the preliminary game the Div. Hdq. squad of the Timber Wolves showed the class which has kept them undefeated in their Division league, when they took the 921st F.A. of the 96th by the 58-38 count. Div. Hdq. led by 10 points at half time. Vandervoort and Fusselman, with 16 and 10 points, high-scored for the losers. The remarkable 27 points sunk by Pvt. Cleve Kennedy really put the Div. Hdq. boys across, backed by the great floor work of Adams and Manion.

For about the first time this season the traveled Timber Wolf division team really got their passing attack on the beam and it was this more than any other factor which gave them victory over the speedy and hard-fighting team of the 96th. Scoring was diversified for both outfits. The 58 Timber Wolf points were earned—Frazier, 13; Duffy, 13; Badgley, 11; Waxman, 5; Adams, 4; H. Brown, 10; C. Brown, 2.

Fighters will represent the 381st Inf. team, which SSO Lt. Robert Barrett says is going great guns and a team of the 383rd Inf., with Lt. Edward McCloy, SSO, in tow.

Nothing Fussy About Fusselman; He Still Adds; 79 Pts. Total

The high and mighty Lester L. Fusselman of the 921st F.A. Bn. still wears the coveted crown of the 96th Division's basketball high scorer with 79 points to his credit in six weeks of competition. Fusselman has been in the lead ever since the round robin series opened up and it looks like he's going to be as permanent as Gibraltar.

Master Sergeant Burdette Owen of the 96th Division Headquarters Company was right behind him at the close of the week's hostilities with 56 points while his team mate, Corporal Norman Weiner, boasted 48 points to put him right ahead of the 921st's J. V.asley who pulled up in fourth place with 47. Donnie G. Vandervort, also of the 921st, has dropped down to fifth with 43 points.

Bear Mountain is a well-known ski resort, but underneath that white stuff skiers glide over and sit down in, Rickey has been told can be found no fewer than five baseball diamonds where the Dodgers can practice their profession—if they don't get tangled up in their skis.

Rickey already has accepted Bear Mountain as a training site, but never a person to leave anything to chance he decided to take his groundkeeper from Ebbe's Field to make an inspection and compile technological data such as excavating. Newspapermen and photographers were included in the expedition to assure that the findings were recorded for posterity.

Many of the newspapermen in the party have accompanied the Dodgers to Havana, Cuba, for training in the last two years and their reactions to the change from tropical to polar conditions may be worthy of historical attention, also, if the phenomena does not destroy the recording instruments.

To West Point
Besides inspecting Bear Mountain the party will look over the field house at West Point, five miles away. It is here the Dodgers probably will do most of their training, if the explorers find what they expect to find on the ground at Bear Mountain.

Arrangements have been made for the Dodgers to use the baseball cage in the Army's field house for three hours on any day when conditions are not suitable for practicing outdoors at Bear Mountain.
