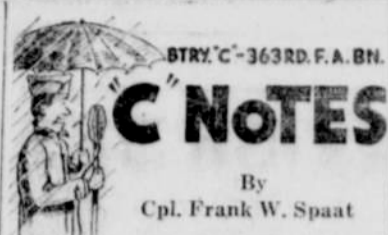
#### Christian Science Churches
