Translations are eligible if the manuscript has not previously been published or serialized in any language anywhere. To the author of the winning manuscript as determined by the judges, the Atlantic Monthly Press will pay, on the date of the announcement of the prize winner, the sum of \$5000: \$2500 as an outright prize and \$2500 as an advance on account of royalties.
