New Delhi, India -(CNS)- Tl most widely used pair of general stars in this war theater are bein worn by newly promoted Brig. Ge William S. Old, of Uvalde, Tex.

The stars originally were sent Brig. Gen. Clayton Bissell, of th Air Force in India and China, E his wife, Brig. Gen. John Magrue er, then head of the American Miltary Mission in China, pinned tl stars on Gen. Bissell.

Next, Gen. Doolittle

Then Col. James H. Doolittle arrived in Chunking after bomb ing Tokio, to find that he was a newly appointed brigadier gen eral. So, Gen. Bissell pinned the stars on Col. Doolittle, who late was promoted to major general

Gen. Doolittle encountered Clai L. Chennault, who had just bee promoted to brigadier genera Since Gen. Doolittle was bound for home where stars were plentift he pinned his insignia on Ge Chennault.

"He successfully executed t relief of the units and by his cou ageous action and coolness und fire inspired officers and men their best efforts thereby prever ing what might have otherwise b come a serious disorder vitally e dangering the successful operation of the division's operation."
