The unlikeliness of Spirit is matter, and the opposite of the real is not divine, it is a human concept. Matter is an error of statement. your folks and my folks and all the other folks contribute to the Red Cross, they do so with a sacred faith and understanding that the money is to be used for emergencies only.

Don't think for a minute that the Red Cross hasn't rendered other services. Hundreds of Camp Adair soldiers have been advised and helped with personal problems, family problems, allotments, insurance, income tax.

You know some soldier whose wife or family have, in one way or another, received assistance from the Red Cross Chapter—that Chapter may be back in your home state or it may be one of the Chapters near the camp. Some of you are enjoying Day Rooms furnished by Red Cross Chapters. Hundreds of you are wearing sweaters, gloves and socks made by Chapter members and workers.

"Remember when you were traveling across the country—how the Red Cross Canteens served you when the train stopped at a station? If the weather was hot, you had cold drinks; if cold, there was hot coffee or chocolate. Perhaps there were candy bars and smokes, magazines, books.

**A Vast Program**

There's the Water Safety Program carried on by the Red Cross. Have you read in the papers what our General and Admirals have said about that! No, Mister, that program isn't a fancy athletic exhibition; that's a life-saving thing! If your ship is bombed at sea and the water is covered with burning oil, you will thank your lucky stars that someone taught you how to jump into, and splash away, burning oil and swim to safety.

"The Red Cross is sending parcels to prisoners; getting messages to the home folks from men in prison camps; locating lost families in the Axis Nations; getting food and medicine to starving, sick people; making millions of surgical bandages which may save your life or the life of that fellow you pal around with. There are the blood banks. There is the hospital and club work all over the world. These are only a few of the many services rendered daily, services we want continued. Remember, Soldier, wherever you go—Iceland, New Guinea, Alaska, India, Europe, Africa—the Red Cross will be there with you to help in every way possible.

The folks back home are glad for this. So are you!

**Star Light, Star Bright On Which Shoulders Will You Shine Tonight**

New Delhi, India —(CNS)— The most widely used pair of general stars in this war theater are being worn by newly promoted Brig. Gen. William S. Old, of Uvalde, Tex.

The stars originally were sent to Brig. Gen. Clayton Bissell, of the Air Force in India and China, his wife, Brig. Gen. John Magruder, then head of the American Military Mission in China, pinned the stars on Gen. Bissell.

**Next, Gen. Doolittle**

Then Col. James H. Doolittle arrived in Chungking after bombing Tokio, to find that he was a newly appointed brigadier general. So, Gen. Bissell pinned the stars on Col. Doolittle, who later was promoted to major general. Gen. Doolittle encountered Col. L. Chennault, who had just been promoted to brigadier general. Since Gen. Doolittle was bound for home where stars were plentiful he pinned his insignia on Gen. Chennault.

Successively the stars were pinned on Caleb V. Haynes, commanding the India Air Task Force; Robert C. Oliver, of Maxwell Field, Ala., forty-year-old head of the Air Service Command in India and then on Gen. Old.

The stars will go back to Gen. Bissell again when Gen. Old gets his own pair.

**Commands Under Fire**

"On being so informed, Colonel Moore proceeded at once to the command post which was still being shelled and there, while exposed to heavy enemy fire, directed the evacuation of the wounded and assumed command of the battalion, personally calling for and directing artillery fire on the enemy mortars until they were silenced.

"He successfully executed the relief of the units and by his courageous action and coolness under fire inspired officers and men their best efforts thereby preventing what might have otherwise become a serious disorder vitally endangering the successful operation of the division's operation."

**Gen. Cook In Tribute**

"Deeds and actions, rather than medals and ribbons, are what count and General Moore, by his action has distinguished himself on the field of battle," General Cook, an address before the division declared. "We can all be proud that General Moore is now a member of the Timber Wolf division, and thus share his glory."

At the colorful ceremony General Cook placed the medal upon General Moore's breast, then graciously allowed Mrs. Moore to pin it on her husband. Two daughters, General and Mrs. Moore were also in the reviewing stand.
