Club 1 Cafeteria Offers Varied Menus

Redecorated Bistro Popular Eating Spot

One of the main counterparts at Service Club 1 . . . the cafeteria . . . re-opened in grand style Wednesday morning at breakfast time. Manned by a competent staff of well-trained personnel, and under the management of Miss Helen Barrett, food expert, this cafeteria is expected to become one of the favorite and most popular "beaneries" at Camp Adair.

Breakfast, luncheon, dinner and "after-theatre snacks" will be served daily starting at 7 a. m., when the cafeteria opens, until curfew at 10 p. m. Daily specials will be offered together with a well-balanced and well-rounded selection of menus.

Entirely renovated is the cafeteria . . . with a new decoration scheme carried out in apple green and pine-colored stain. All new equipment has been furnished both for the cafeteria and the adjoining fountain room, and new refrigeration units have been installed.

Of paramount importance is the fact that the renovations have increased the total seating capacity from approximately 115 to 180 or so. A more cozy atmosphere has also been suggested, in the addition of colorful drapes and wall-baskets of ivy.

Service Club No. 1 Reopens Saturday With Night Club
