

# Camp Adair Dollars Roll in for Red Cross

## Record Returns Are Reported as Fund Campaign Draws to Close

War fund dollars for American Red Cross war activities were rolling from Camp Adair toward national headquarters this week.

Reports from civil and military authorities in the camp indicated a record contribution during the early stages of the drive which started March 1 throughout the nation.

On the post, solicitation of funds is being carried on only among the civilian employees and army officers. Enlisted men are not being requested to contribute in accordance with a decision reached in a conference between the War Department and the Red Cross.

However, enlisted men with previous memberships wishing to renew them, or men desiring membership, may pay their money to the special service officers of their organizations, or to any members of the Red Cross staff on the post.

### Civil Guards First

First civilian organization in Camp Adair to make a completed report was the civil guards. This group will receive an emblem for 100 per cent contributions, according to Everett Lisle, employee relations director for the camp, who is in charge of the war fund for civilians.

Post personnel and many of the small offices have completed returns, Mr. Lisle said, but it is expected that another 10 days will be required to complete the solicitation. Each civilian employee received a letter to which was attached a contribution blank and other material held in place by a paper clip.

The letter requested, that because of the metals shortage, the paper clip should be returned. The clips are being returned, Mr. Lisle said, as holders for paper money.

Among the officers of the 96th and Timber Wolf divisions, plans are being completed for the drive and many contributions from individuals already have been received.

In the 96th, collections have been placed in the hands of the special service officers and collections will be made at the time the officers pay mess bills. It is planned to list all contributors for the issuance later of Red Cross membership cards which will be prepared in the office of Verl Lewis, Field Director for the camp.

Officers of the Service Command were reminded of the drive at noon mess Wednesday by Post Chaplain Lloyd V. Harmon who reviewed the work of the Red Cross.

### Chaplain Stevens Will Visit Colonel McCoy

He will meet with the chaplains of the Post at 1:30 p. m. Saturday in Chapel 7. Chaplain Stevens was formerly the pastor of the First Methodist church in Corvallis.

As well as applying to soldiers whose mail is handled by the Army postal system, civilian employees of the post also come under this order. Anyone who attempts to evade this order will be court-martialed.

All organizations at Fort Dix will have their own censors, and letters must be placed unsealed in company mail boxes.
