Night" and "Western Jamboree"; "Square Dance Night" and "Jam and Jive Night." The latest activity, plans for which are in the last stages of completion, is a "Soldier-Artist Craft Class" to be conducted nightly at Club 2 as suggested by Camp Artist Pfc. Donald Lynch.

Cafeterias Popular Outstanding attractions are the two post cafeterias, located in the north wings of the Service Clubs. Herein attractive and well-balanced menus are available, together with "daily specials," served attractively amid pleasant and restful surroundings. Both cafeteria hostesses, Miss Barrett and Miss Trindle, are experts on food, its preparation and cafeteria management. The staffs manning the kitchen and steam tables are experienced in foods and the cheerful atmosphere of the room itself is inviting.

Brand-new equipment has been installed, such as refrigeration units, and the kitchens are modern and complete. Both cafeterias are operated from 7 a. m. until 10 p. m. daily and from 8 a. m. until 10 p. m. Sundays.

Occupying the south wing of the Clubs are the two post libraries, with reading matter ranging from Plutarch's Lives to the latest issue of "Time." The main floor of the libraries shelves thousands of volumes ... reference, fiction and non-fiction, news maps, current magazines and periodicals and other typical library "musts." Art works are often on display as well as posters for recommended reading and suggested ideas. Currently, a series of water-colors depicting Camp Adair life as it was in "Tent City" by Pfc. Don Lynch, is on display in Club 1 Library.

The upstairs portion of the section is devoted to reading and writing space, where the enlisted man may write letters or read a novel relaxing in an easy chair. New Furniture Added

The main portion of the club, where the larger activities such as "Night Club Night" are held, ranks with any officers' club on the post. In fact, in the words of Col. McCoy, "Every effort has been made

to give the enlisted men as attractive clubs as those belonging to the officers."

A quantity of new furniture, with emphasis on eye-appeal as well as comfort, has been purchased and added to both clubs. Occasional pieces, such as tile-inlaid coffee tables, leather hassocks, ottomans and indirect floor-lamps, give a homey touch to the clubs, a touch which is emphasized and dramatized even more with the addition of home-spun drapes in bright colored plaids, and scatter rugs.

The walls at Club 1 have been tinted an aqua hue and the door and window frames in ivory-buff. The floors of both clubs have been sanded and re-finished and are par-

ticularly suited to the occasional dances at the Clubs.

The balcony surrounding the lounge has been equipped, in either club, with writing tables and chairs, and indirect wall-bracket lamps. There are large and welcome fireplaces both on the main floor and on the balcony, with furniture arranged around them as a focal point.

Vases of flowers and hanging wall-baskets of flowers are filled with seasonal flowers and the true essence of comfort and hominess is the prevailing note.

All this is at the disposal of each and every enlisted man stationed at Camp Adair. And each man should feel proud that such a place as a Service Club such as the ones on this post, are at his disposal. It is possible, with the available facilities, to spend an entire day at either club.
