Camp Observes Easter With Fitting Services

Oregon College Chorus to Sing; Sgt. Black Presents Trumpeteers

Easter will be fittingly observed at Camp Adair!

At the Field House, a 120-voice chorus from Oregon State College will be the main feature on the general Easter Day service this coming Sunday between the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock.

Various SCU commanders are making arrangements for two breakfasts; so the soldiers may have an opportunity to attend the Easter Service. The first chow will be at 6 o'clock in the morning and a second one at 8:15. This will give many a chance to eat either before or following the program.

Three trumpeteers have been chosen by T/Sgt. Bob Black. They are Pfc. William Duncan, De Los Smith, and Telford Dutton.

The college chorus is under the direction of Dr. Paul Petri, head of the music department at Oregon State.

Post Chaplain, Major Lloyd V. Harmon, assisted by Chaplain Irwin Whetsall and Chaplain Edward Bartell will conduct the service.

Cpl. Glenn S. Daun is to accompany the chorus and play two Easter numbers: "Christus Resurrexit" by Ranello and Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus."

Major Harmon reports that the Post Commander and the Chaplains are particularly desirous of seeing as large an attendance as possible.

"Officers and enlisted men," said Chaplain Harmon, "are especially urged to be in attendance at this Easter Service."

The Oregon State College Chorus will sing "Christ, our Passover" by Tours. A second number is entitled: "Te Deum Laudamus," by Father Vincent Gray of Corvallis. He is rector of the Good Samaritan church there.

War Dept. Reports Loss of U. S. Mail

The loss through enemy action of more than two thousand sacks of United States mail carried on United Nations ships and destined for American soldiers overseas in recent weeks was reported this week by the Army Postal Service.

The mailing public, the War Department said, should be guided accordingly in cases involving non-receipt of mail by American troops abroad.

These mails lost on the high seas represent a great many individual pieces. They originated in various parts of the country for the most part during the month of February, it was stated.

The mails thus lost, it was revealed, were destined for points in the United Kingdom, Iceland, North Africa, Egypt and India. A considerable portion was first-class mail. These facts are based upon a report appearing in the Army and Navy Journal.

Timber Wolves Invade Portland; Capture City

Crack Troops From Camp Adair Participate in War Bond Drive; Show Civilians Bit of Army Life

Riding into Portland on block after block of olive-drab army trucks, 800 picked men from the Timber Wolf division of Camp Adair "attacked" and successfully "captured" the city, every man, woman and child of it, at 9:40 a. m. Tuesday.

The "invasion," which clicked along so well that the troops took the city 20 minutes ahead of schedule, was highlight of the second war loan drive, through which Oregon is being called upon to buy \$100,000,000 in bar bonds to aid the nation's \$13,000,000,000 quota.

Dunkel in Lead

First to "take" the city were Brigadier-General W. C. Dunkel, in charge of the "invasion," and Colonel Paul R. Knight, combat troop commander, who lead their men into Portland at 9:40 a. m.

After a swing through the city the howling Timber Wolves set up stations at four downtown points, one at Victory Center, where Mayor Earl Riley was guest of honor at an army lunch at noon; a second in front of the art museum on S.W. Park; a third at S.W. 6th avenue and Pine street, and the fourth at the foot of S.W. Washington street.

Included among sections established at the four camps were 81-mm. mortar divisions, 50-caliber
