Books May Be Sent To Prisoner Camps

A program for the distribution of books to officially identified prisoners of war and civilian internees in enemy occupied countries has just been set up by seven government agencies and the Red Cross, the Office of War Information announced. The plan also provides for reception of books by prisoners in United States internment camps. Restrictions on sending V-mail to these prisoners and internees were also announced. Any such letters passing through the Office of Censorship will be returned to the senders, OWI explained.

Doubtfuls Banned

Books containing charts, nautical tables, or waterways information; stories of espionage, propaganda or geography or "any subject which may be considered doubtful or of a technical or scientific nature, including patents, inventions and discoveries," are banned by the new rules. All magazines and newspapers "regardless of date of publication" are also prohibited from being sent to camps abroad.

For any person wishing to send a book to someone he knows is in an axis prison or internment camp, this is how the plan works: Since only new books can be sent directly

to individuals, the sender gives the publisher or bookseller the prisoner's name, address and number. The publisher wraps and addresses the book, forwards it to the Office of Censorship's New York Station where it is checked for conformity to the regulation and for security reasons. If approved, the book is mailed directly to the prisoner; only one package of 5 pounds every 30 days.

Stirring Photographs in Portland Exhibit

Russ. War Depicted; Other Features Also

Pictures of galloping Cossacks and mobile artillery, grim shots of the siege of Sevastopol, the epic fight at Stalingrad, guerilla warfare and civilian defense work are all dramatically presented in a notable collection of one hundred front-line photographs featuring an exhibition to continue until May 5 at the Portland Art Museum.

Other Exhibits

At present the Museum also features two important exhibits — a superb collection of 15th to 18th Century Tapestries and a collection of works by Picasso. "These include ten paintings from the Museum of Modern Art and are supplemented by 24 etchings and photographs and two collections of book illustrations.

The Picasso show closes tomorrow. The tapestries will be shown until next Wednesday. The museum is located at West Park and Madison in Portland, Oregon. The concert and exhibits are free.

The current Museum Bulletin announces that the Camp Adair soldier artists work shop fund is well past the half way mark of \$400 set by Museum Director R. T. Davis.
