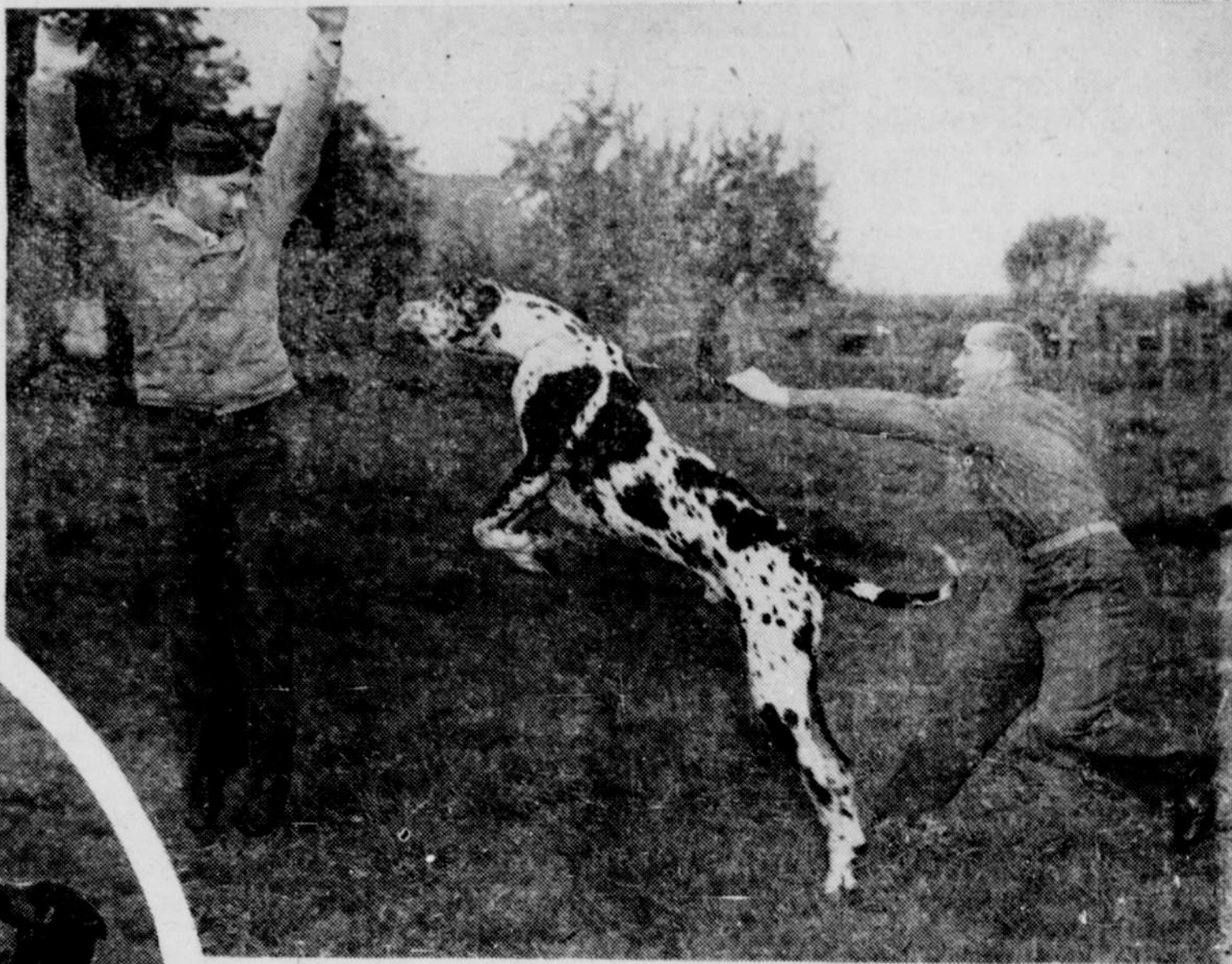


# Post Sentry Dogs Emerge From Basic, Rough, Tough, And Ready Warriors

## Army Offers Soldiers University Training

Revision of requirements for admission to Army Specialized Training Program were announced this week by T/5 Wesley Shepherd, in charge of this department at Post Headquarters.

Men rejected because of failure to pass the ASTP test a few weeks ago will be reconsidered in the light of the new directive.

#### Requirements

ASTP field selection boards may now recommend for training, enlisted men with a score of 115 or better on the Army General Classification test. Candidates who have not passed their twenty-second birthday on the date of recommendation must be high school graduates or the equivalent, and must not have had more than two years of college work unless their college work included:

One year of college physics, or one year of college mathematics, or three college psychology courses, or a fluent speaking knowledge of a foreign language.
