### Warning: 'Don't Abuse Franking Privilege

Free mail is one of the great privileges of the service man—that it is a privilege which has been abused in two particular ways, is pointed out in a Post directive this week:

First, the franking privilege "does not apply to correspondence from wives or other relatives nor to any matter sent to the personnel of the military or naval forces by persons who are not members of such forces."

Secondly, the free mail privilege does not apply to envelopes or cards indorsed by a member of the armed forces for use by others, such as members of his family.
