## Overseas Mail Law Sees Vital Change

### No Longer Need CO's OK to Send Parcels

You no longer have to get your Commanding Officer's O.K. to get packages from home. That important change in overseas mail regulations has just been announced by the War Department . . . following a long editorial campaign by YANK.

The new regulations say that people in the States can send a package to a soldier overseas if they've received a letter from the soldier asking for whatever's in the package and they show at the post office the envelope carrying the APO cancellation mark.

There's been no change in restrictions on the size of the package. It can't weigh more than five pounds, be longer than fifteen inches, or more than 36 inches in length and width combined. Post offices at home will accept only one package a week addressed to the same soldier.

Right on the heels of that announcement is a report from Army Post Office Headquarters giving some interesting facts about the overseas mail picture as a whole. APO explains that the biggest reason why letters from men overseas lots of times get home faster than letters written to them is that there's more space on ships and

These ships and planes carry their biggest supply loads when they leave the United States. There are other reasons for delay in getting mail. There's always some delay when material is being read and approved by censors. Sometimes Headquarters decides that for security reasons mail to certain areas or certain units must be held for a while. One of the most important angles is that most overseas mail has to be transported on ships because there's so much of it—20,000,000 letters and packages a week was the last official count. Which means that sometimes mail has to pile up at harbors while convoys are being assembled . . . or while waiting for convoys to come in. There's never any backlog of mail if there's any kind of ship available.
